







2018 at Ashburton College (my second year here) has been even better than the first. I have

Thank you to everyone who has believed in me and had my back through the past five years.



This year helped solidify progress in a number of significant areas for our College. Whilst there wasn't any one event that dominated the year, the overall trend was that our place is improving across the board.

Our year got away to the best possible start with the release of our 2017 NCEA results. They had improved markedly upon the previous year and most clearly in 2 important areas. Our male results had improved at all levels and our Maori results were the best they had ever been! There were numerous causes for such improvement. Our ability to predict and track progress from early Term 2 and then report these predicted grades to both the learners and their whanau has certainly improved results.

This year's Student Executive were a fantastic group and we introduced the idea of Deputy Head Boy and Girl to try and ease the burden we had traditionally placed on our Head Boy and Girl. This year's Executive have continued to front many of our school events such as Ash Dance, however they have introduced several innovations to improve our College. These have included 'AshColl Presents' a series of videos organised by students to highlight our place. These can be found via Youtube. Another innovation has been the 'shared morning tea'. This is designed around the concept of having food available for those who might need some support. By making it open to everyone it removes any stigma for those who attend. This scheme has been well supported by several cafes and regulars who provide home baking. Our Student Exec have also started to produce a fortnightly column in the Ashburton Guardian with news / opinions from a student POV. The beauty of the executives is that they are very responsive to issues as they emerge. They have traditions such as their Anzac Day speech but are able to adopt projects when the need emerges.

For the last 2 years our staff have been working towards introducing curriculum change. Because information is now available to anyone at any time, future thinking schools need to be producing students with a set of skills and dispositions that will equip them for a different future. These skills include: being a collaborative, creative problem solver who has resiliency. They will need to have great people skills and traditionally secondary schools have been more concerned about students learning knowledge. In 2019 we are making some changes to our curriculum structure. In year 9 we are introducing a curriculum pilot to trial subject integration. This will require a group of teachers to plan collaboratively around a class with an emphasis on growing their soft skills and dispositions. It will also require staff to develop and assess these future skills. So how do you develop and assess the concept of resiliency? In addition we have created a designated hour of time to teach these future skills and to have more time to work with a smaller group of students. Currently the average teacher has 10 minutes at the start of the day to: take the roll. read the notices and try and develop a pastoral relationship with a class. If these interpersonal skills are important we need to make time to grow them. From the start of 2019 all teachers will have a group of students assigned to them for an hour per week. The aim is to create time to track progress, form meaningful relationships between staff, learners and their whanau and to develop the necessary future skills. This hour will be scheduled for everybody at the same time so we can benefit from having our seniors working with our juniors with events such as reading mentors or peer support. These looming changes in education reflect the changes in

During Term 3 we had a scheduled visit from ERO (Education Review Office). They acknowledged the improvements we had made in terms of creating a more responsive curriculum, improved tracking and academic results and reinforced our positive staff/student relationships. Their report reinforces the fact that Ashburton College is trending in the right direction, whilst working to prepare our students for a different world. The report itself is a reflection on the hard mahi by staff and our Board of T rustees so well done to all for their efforts since our last visit in 2015. Our current BOT is functioning very well and has a complete range of governance skills. Not every school is so blessed.

At this time of year we always farewell a number of staff. Earlier we had farewelled

Andrea Griffin who had secured the position of Associate Principal at Burnside. Ken Pow retires at the end of this year. His passion for the German Language and chess will be hard to replace. Can I thank all staff departing for their contributions to our place. As Principal I realise just how fortunate I am to have the quality of staff we have at Ashburton College. A school is only as good as the quality of its staff and the supportiveness of its community. We are blessed on both counts!!

Preparing Ashburton College students for the future is the key focus on the Board of Trustees. For them to be successful, our students need to be connected, collaborative and intuitive thinkers. The BOT, school leadership and teachers have taken these challenges on board. Teachers are actively looking for areas that different subjects can collaborate and work together, and teach together with. In 2019, a number of Year 9 students will be part of a collaborative learning process. We have noted significant interest from teachers, parents and students.

The collaborative learning environment has received a fair amount of press to date. Both good, and bad. At Ashburton College the teachers are approaching this teaching style with caution. Relying on best practice, good communication and working through the issues

and challenges carefully. We do not want to impair the education of this generation of students following a fad or fashion. However, the opportunities, work place environment and challenges for this generation of students have changed dramatically over the last 2-3 decades. It would be remiss of us as a BOT not to acknowledge these challenges, and support the school leadership to meet them.

The school has been actively engaged with ministry to enhance our school. It is acknowledged by the BOT that the current

school is not an acceptable learning or working environment. The buildings are 45+ years hold. The concrete block structures are difficult and costly to renovate, we have been working with ministry since 2015 to come up with a solution. The size and complexity of the problems have extended the time frames for decisions. We are hopeful that we will have some clarity early 2019 for the structure future of our school. With the challenges and changes that are looming for education, this presents a unique opportunity for Ashburton College.

The Ashburton BOT members represent a wide area of interests from our community. 

Academics suggested Diana consider applying for a Scholarship offered by the Royal Society of New Zealand, who cover 70% of the Course and flights costs. Accommodation in Germany was in a hostel at the Gottingen University where the course was held. Diana filled out the relevant application form and letter outlining why she was interested in the opportunity. From the list of Science Camps on offer, she ticked her preferences which were the London International Youth Science Forum, the USA International Space Camp and three options in Australia as well as the German option she was successful in gaining. Diana and a student from Rolleston joined thirty other students from all over the world. Diana said that each week was broken down into a new subject. For the first three weeks Diana studied Neurophysiology, Immunology and Anatomy, while the last week was spent in the Workshop on a chosen research project. Diana chose Neurophysiology as her topic, with a view to her likely university choices of Neuro Science or Bio Medicine. In between study there were a number of culturaltype interactions and trips. The Royal Society web-site says that 'this particular opportunity is especially for senior secondary school and undergraduate students who are achieving excellence in their Science studies and want to continue studying Science at a higher level. They will participate in four weeks of intense Science where they will work in a small group supervised by scientists at the University of Gottingen and affiliated research organisations. Andrew Cleland, Chief Executive of Royal Society Te Aparangi says that 'this is a great opportunity for talented young New Zealanders to interact with experts at the top of their fields in science. Overall, nearly fifty students are selected from around New Zealand across the range of courses available. Diana said she was very excited by the whole experience, plus the opportunity to have a taste of university study. The course details, working in 'real' research labs with hi-tech equipment was 'insane' and 'so exciting. An added bonus after the conclusion of the course was being able to stay on for a further week and visit her previous host family, who she hadn't seen since last March.





Dave is principally a teacher of Physical Education and Health but, during his tenure at College, has given much time, energy and effort, often in time which could well be regarded as Dave's personal time. In brief, included in his contributions are Health

Programme Co-ordinator (iointly): developer of Fitness Test Battery for Aoraki Region schools: College Peer Support programme trainer; stage crew involvement in College productions; cornet player as required in College Orchestra, Jazz and Concert Bands and Last Post player at College Anzac Services; regular staff member at the annual Year 13 Leadership Camp; support timetabler and relieving cover teacher organiser. Within the Health Co-ordinator role, Dave was instrumental in introducing the Kia Kaha Anti-Bullying Programme into the Year 9 Health Programme, Student Mentoring, and the Year 9 Supported Learning Class. Sport, fitness and being an 'active' role model for students is a passion and belief of Dave's, as is his belief in the educational value of sport in the lives of young people. In his earlier years at College he coached two football teams but is more well-known as 'Mr Volleyball'. Dave developed the inclusion of this sport at College, from the time of his arrival. and as a Coach, has contributed enormously - including developing student leadership through empowering students as coaches and referees.

His care and concern for students, and those facing challenges and with learning difficulties, has meant that his years as Dean at Junior School level have been a natural fit for his skills, to the benefit of many students and

their families. Dave has been actively supportive of, and willing to be involved in, the wider life of the College, including as Chairperson of the College PPTA Branch for two years, a member of Staff Social Committee since his arrival at College, and Faculty representative on the previous Learning, Co-operative Learning and Staff Development Standing Committees. He has also been willingly available to work with teachers in training and to act as a buddy for new staff to College.

### Farewell To Kim Morrison

Kim worked twenty-one years and three months at College as a Learning Support Assistant, principally working within the Student Learning Support Unit, with students who have a range of disabilities and needs; and also accompanying students to, and supporting them in, mainstream

classes. Kim is an unobtrusive staff member, preferring to 'get on with the job' and having a low profile, and is currently our longest-serving Learning Support Assistant. Kim's contributions have been significant, meaningful, and given with a willingness to offer time above and beyond her paid hours, and to undertake any tasks put to her. Kim is a very good Learning Support Assistant, highly respected in this role as a dedicated, caring, hard-working, conscientious and capable staff member, and one who has always put the students first, giving strong support to teaching staff.

Kim is respected for her sound judgement and balanced and calming approach to all challenges and inter-personal relationships. She has a positive attitude, good 'problem-solving' skills and her organisational capabilities were evident on many occasions. Knowledgeable, she additionally researched information on students' conditions in order to better assist them. New ideas or innovations suggested by Kim were regularly adopted, while many responsibilities and higher duties tasks were effectively undertaken. In her time at College she has been involved in a number of special programmes and, as a trained swimming instructor, set up and ran a Special Olympics Swimming Programme, with IDEA Services clients and staff, and was heavily involved in the transition programme with Idea Services. The introduction of a music programme within the Unit was another innovation promoted by Kim. She has participated in the range of programmes, including supporting students in Work Skills, at the Riding for Disabled and being involved in the various Unit Programmes with agency representatives and finalising/reviewing IEPs (Individual Educational Programmes) with families and students.

For many years Kim was the NZEI College Staff Representative, a role she carried out with balance and fairness.

### Tribute to Brian Edmondston

Ashburton College owes a huge debt of gratitude to former staff member, Brian Edmondston. Brian passed away this year following failing health through Motor Neuron Disease but also. as wife Audrey (a former Ashburton College teacher as well) said, after a long retirement period which they both enjoyed and appreciated. Brian's first year teaching in Ashburton was in 1964 at the, then, Hakatere College which, with Ashburton High School, amalgamated to become Ashburton College in 1965. Coming to Ashburton, initially, for two years' 'country service' as was required to be undertaken in those days, it was to the benefit of generations of families and students that he and Audrey chose to stay in Ashburton and at Ashburton College. After thirty years of quality contribution to the College, Brian elected to retire in May 1994. Brian was, first and foremost, a teacher of History and Social Studies and, earlier, of Latin. For a period of time when Latin was not included in the timetable, he tutored a group of keen

students to also consider the causes and effects intertwined with historical events. As an aside, it has to be said that Brian was much sought-after as a member of quiz teams! Other significant contributions while at College were at a leadership level. In the days when Ashburton College's roll was over 1500 it was divided into two schools, North and South, with each school managed by a Principal. Deputy Principal and Dean leadership team, each under the overall Principal of the time. Brian held the South School Dean position within this structure. Brian also gave many years as Staff Leader of Blue House and, reportedly, at Blue House Assemblies would have a feature 'Today in History' slot where, in entertaining fashion, he would outline the relevant historical occasion. Amongst his contributions to the history of the College was a key role in the College's Silver Jubilee Booklet production and subsequent involvement in the preparation of the College's 50th Jubilee Booklet. Above and beyond his undeniable capabilities and place (speaking historically!) as a founding teaching staff member of Ashburton College, Brian was highly respected for who he was as a person. He was personable, capable, caring and a person who made a difference to the lives of others and was a positive influence on many. Past students, staff and the Ashburton community have much to thank him for and have been the richer for his contributions and for knowing him.

### Year 13 Biology Portobello Field Trip

Biology teacher Alice Nash says that from Sunday 17 June-Tuesday 19 June thirty one Year 13 Biology students travelled to Dunedin for the now annual Portobello Field Trip. On Sunday morning the group gathered at College at 4:45am, tired-eyed and a wee bit grumpy apparently! A five hour fun-filled bus drive down to Dunedin was to come, with a guick breakfast and well-needed coffee stop in Oamaru. The group arrived at the Portobello Peninsula at around 10:00am, at the New Zealand Marine Institute, the venue for carrying out the Bio 3.1 study. It was very cold. Different groups searched for crabs on the shore at Portobello. Students gained confidence over the three days re handling the crabs, caring for them and making sure of adherence to the Ethics Code which binds those working with animals. First up was learning about crabs, their natural environments, how to identify them and handle them correctly. The group also learnt about ethics in terms

of how to experiment on the crabs without harming them. Following this instruction it was down to the beach to look at the different types of crabs in the area, their distribution and their distinct features. The afternoon was filled with writing hypotheses and methods. Monday morning brought about another early start, with a 6:30am wake-up knock on the door. After a hot, cooked breakfast it was back on the bus and off to start the day's studies. On Monday

the group carried out their own investigations, ranging from shelter-seeking, feeding, pH, temperature and salinity investigations; using half each of crabs and common shore crabs. Some investigations showed trends while others had no apparent trend, and some crabs didn't

want to move, others didn't want to eat! This led to a need to get good at problemsolving and making about what to do next. It was a long and full day, leaving the lab just after 5:00pm. Tuesday was made up of more trials and replicates, followed by some statistical analysis, and finishing working with the crabs and wrapping up the study at 3:00pm, leaving with

data and knowledge to enable completion of the Achievement Standard. Again a stop was made at Oamaru for some dinner and a quick break, before continuing on to College for an 8:00pm return.

Alice said that it was a fun, enjoyable trip away, which allowed for the hands-on learning that Science is all about, in a real laboratory with 'very flash' lab equipment.

### Year 12 Geography Students' Field Trip to Mt Cook

On Thursday and Friday 03 and 04 May, the Year 12 Geography class completed their now annual two day field trip to Aoraki Mount Cook. Geography teacher Jemma Hurst said that there, they examined the sizes of sediment on the Scree Slope of Red Tarns. Students have to walk up 1160 steps to get to the bottom of the Scree slope but the breath-taking views make up for any pain endured on the way up. Additionally, two presentations are watched at the DOC Centre looking at how glaciers are formed and the human impacts that have taken place to date in the Aoraki Mount Cook National Park and how various parties work to try and minimise these impacts. Students also enjoyed the opportunity to walk up to the Hooker Glacier - incuding one student who took the opportunity to swim in the Hooker Lake which is fed into straight from the glacier.

is the second year we have based ourselves at the Canterbury Underwater Club Lodge. Annie noted that these are good facilities but with less work space than the University of Canterbury Lab where the groups traditionally went to, but this facility is no longer available. Part of the Year 13 Geography Curriculum is a study of interacting natural processes and the resultant landforms. College uses the Kaikoura Peninsula as its case study area, as a wide range of varying processes occur in a relatively small area, making it particularly suitable for the required studies. As a result of the work undertaken there the students are now able to make connections between the theory of interacting coastal processes and their operation in the Kaikoura environment. Pouring rain hampered the first exercises on arrival on the Wednesday. However, this eventually gave way to heavy drizzle and the group was able to complete two beach profiles. They were fortunate enough to have warm weather conditions when walking around the peninsula on the following day. The activities undertaken included avoiding seals (!), surveying slopes, not falling over on wet rocks, field sketches, observing and analysing the landscape. Data collected will now be used as the basis for an NCEA Research Assessment.

### Year 11 History Field Trip

On Thursday 17 May, Year 11 History students

participated in the Holocaust Centre of New Zealand (HCNZ) Outreach Programme. Education Director Chris Harris came to Ashburton College to speak to the students about various aspects of the Holocaust and its impact and significance on people at the time and in the present. History teacher Greta Hampton said that students were able to ask questions and gather information for their research internal assessment they are currently completing. Greta noted that it was a very powerful presentation. The College is very privileged to be a part of the Holocaust Centre's Outreach Programme and valued the time they spent with us. The Centre is the nation's leading organisation in Holocaust education and remembrance, dedicated to ensuring the lessons of the Holocaust remain relevant today and for future generations. HCNZ is active in student/teacher education and human rights - challenging discrimination and prejudice, and encouraging diversity and inclusiveness in a modern democracy. Their activities span teaching, research, publishing, archiving, public commemorations and events, and recording and sharing survivor testimonies. The Centre itself is open to the public, offering a vital historical overview of Holocaust survivors' journeys to a safe haven in New Zealand.

### Year 12 History Field Trip

On Wednesday 04 April the Year 12 History students had an 'outside' excursion, to the Ashburton Museum, with regard to their Gallipoli Internal Assessment. Supporting these students were two South Canterbury Museum personnel who travelled up to Ashburton, from Timaru.

As part of their input they ran the World War One Survivors' game. History teacher Amanda Hewson said that students were split into two groups with one group looking at a range of items the soldiers themselves used in the war during any down time - e.g: items for hygiene, personal grooming and letter-writing tools. Students also

got taught about the game Two-ups' which was a form of gambling for the soldiers, very much like heads and tails, and they got to handle particular clothing that soldiers wore at Gallipoli. While this was happening the other group went downstairs into the display area of the museum to play the 'Survivors' Game'. Here they had to get into three groups and were assigned

either to Gallipoli, the Western Front or the Sinai in Palestine. The students had information about the conditions and were then allowed a limited time to choose a number of items off the wall. These ranged from types of weapons to items of clothing. At the end, each group was given a marking card. For every wrong item they got they lost 10%. The overall percentage would determine injured their soldier was or whether they died. This was

a valuable learning opportunity as students realised that, depending on where a soldier was posted in the war, this dictated their chance of survival. It also was helpful in writing diary entries on Gallipoli for their first internal assessment.

### Year 13 History Field Trip

Social Sciences teachers Amanda Hewson and Greta Hampton travelled with the Year 13 History class, mid March, for a day trip to Akaroa, leaving College at 7:30am. Amanda gives a summary of the day's programme: She said that a valuable addition to this year's trip was the availability of History teacher Mel Tainui, to come from Christchurch to talk to the students about the history of her tribe in the local area and the relationships formed between the local Maori leaders and Europeans, from the 1830s. One major focus of Mel's talk was learning of the 1848 Kemp's Purchase, where around 20 million acres was arranged for purchase by the Government of the time, for 2000 pounds. The final settlement was actually for a lot less, and students felt a sense of disbelief that Ngai Tahu should have been treated so unfairly. They also had little knowledge of the repercussions for future generations and the sense of mourning that was felt as a result. Students were able to gain some knowledge of how an event like this led to long-term effects on the people involved. Students then got to venture into the

Akaroa Township and up to the very first French Cemetery on the hill. They learnt, although consecrated land now, the original graves had been dug up due to land settlement and now a monument represents the original graves of the settlers. From there students got time to

wander around Akaroa and get some lunch. At 1:30pm the group met at the Akaroa Museum where staff had kindly put together numerous resources students might like to look at for their internal assessment on a significant place linked to an event in 19th Century Canterbury/Waitaha. They also had time to look around the Museum at various displays. From there it was en route back to Ashburton. The students were excellent ambassadors for the College, asking quality questions and making the most of the places we visited, and the information gathered. Next was the walk onto Onawe Peninsula - where we swear every year it gets harder to climb! Well, for the staff anyway, Amanda suggested. On the Peninsula students were able to appreciate just what Ngai Tahu were faced with in 1832, when attacking tribe Ngati Toa, led by Te Rauparaha from Kapiti, invaded the peninsula.

# Outdoor Education Adrenalin Forest Challenges

The Year 12 Physical Education classes enjoyed a day at Adrenalin Forest in Christchurch on Tuesday 08 May. Phys Ed teacher Karen McKenzie said that thirty eight students put on a safety harness, listened to a safety briefing and then had to demonstrate the use of the magnetic safety clips before they set off to explore the pathways on the high ropes. Close to \$500,000 has been spent on the Adrenalin Forest High Ropes Course over the years, to make it a physically safe but challenging experience. The pathways range from 2m-25m high. Levels 3-6 are particularly challenging, and students probably didn't realise how tiring

stretching and pulling yourself along could be, with some pathways taking nearly an hour to complete. The students returned back to College to study the risks involved when using the high ropes, and to develop safety strategies to keep all high rope users safe.





From the challenges, the students undertake team building, learn the importance of communication within teams and problemsolving, and grow trust and confidence; strengthening and building class relationships. This day is part of the Health and Physical Education Curriculum and Peer Support Programme which Year 9 students participate in at Ashburton College.

### Year 12 Physics Students on Radioactivity Field Trip

During the last week of Term Two the Year 12 Physics and Science students went on the yearly radioactivity field trip to Christchurch. Teacher Bryan Bell indicated they 'had a great

time.' The day takes the students Rutherford's the historical place museum in the Arts Centre, Here, students can enjoy hands-on activities learning about science, in the actual rooms where Rutherford studied. The time here involved a walk through Ernest Rutherford's

laboratory, plus the various learning activities. An interesting one was learning about Alexander Litvinenko, the spy who was poisoned with a tiny amount of Polonium-210, a radioactive substance.

The group then went to the University of Canterbury (UC), where they investigated how different types of radiation are absorbed by organic material, and held a spent uranium core from an old test reactor – described as 'pretty cool stuff'. Also viewed was a liquid nitrogencooled super conductor hovering over a magnet, in a demonstration of electromagnetism.

# Year 13 Physics Students to University of Canterbury

The first person to decode the signal received a \$50 Hoyts voucher. Aidan Campbell from the College group took first prize, by decoding the signal before some others of us had even worked out one letter! After that we were given a look into the Nanotechnology facilities, where we all had to don lab coats, safety glasses, and shoe covers. This area of Electrical Engineering combines with Chemistry in such an interesting way. This was followed by being shown around a facility where UC personnel were hard at work creating electric motors and vehicles, including an old Land Cruiser which they were converting to be electric!! They also had a Tesla Coil on display which played an impressive medley of famous songs in true electric fashion.

The last place we were shown was a room where all the students were taught about three different types of electric motors. After this we got to have a go on a virtual reality race car, where the driver sat in a bucket seat in an old race car body with a VR headset on. Cameras tracked head movement, meaning a person playing really felt they were driving a real car! After this we all headed back to Ashburton. For me personally, this trip was an awesome experience, which really gave me an insight to Engineering, a subject I am looking at studying next year.

### 2018 Australia New Zealand Brain Bee Competition

Back in March, Year 11 students Willow Diedricks and Brendan Fleming entered the online regional round of the 2018 Australia New Zealand Brain Bee Competition. This is an annual competition for Year 11 students who are interested in Neuroscience. Entering the competition required a significant amount of extra work on top of NCEA studies, as the students learned about the Anatomy and Physiology of the brain. Both students qualified for the South Island finals of the competition which was held in Dunedin on Tuesday 26 June. As well as taking part in the competition, Willow and Brendan took the opportunity to explore the University of Otago. The first visit was to the Electron Microscope Unit where students were able to use Scanning and Transmission Electron Microscopes to view brain tissue, kidney tissue and even a head louse at magnifications of over 10,000 times! They also got to see the Confocal microscope in action, to view nerve cells. The Otago Museum offers lots of experiences for budding scientists. Enjoyed were the many activities in Discovery World and the Science Gallery, before visiting the Tropical Rainforest and marvelling at the hundreds of tropical butterflies. The next visit was to the Anatomy Museum which was founded in 1874. This museum holds one of the largest collections of human anatomical specimens in the world. including many specimens which are unique to Oceania. Much of the collection is preserved Article by Caleb Livingstone human remains of early Otago settlers. It is a

began with a World conference in Christchurch run the amazing people at World Vision. Not only was this conference eye opening and informing but it got our ideas rolling for the upcoming 40 Hour Famine. This year the Famine's focus was on the world's newest country, South Sudan. South Sudan gained independence from Sudan in July 2011 after decades of

war, the birth of the new country brought hope for a bright future. However, in 2013 conflict once again broke out leaving more than 5.7 million South Sudanese without enough food to sustain themselves. Nearly 4 million people are displaced due to conflict and hunger, 2 million of which have fled to neighbouring countries. Of those displaced, 60% are children. This year AshColl students raised over \$2,700 in support of South Sudanese children, children who are not so different from them, and saw Green take out the House competition. A week after the 40 Hour Famine was completed, Road Crash Day took place. This event was directed at Year 12 students and focused on raising awareness of the consequences that come from dangerous driving. Unlike previous years, this day followed a different programme, with different organisers. Road Safety Education Limited (RYDA) is the leading provider of road safety education for youth in New Zealand and this year we were lucky enough to be a part of it.

# STUDENT WELFARE / SADD COMMITTEE

This day consisted of 6 different sessions, each showcasing different aspects of dangerous driving and the consequences that follow. After this we had SADD week (Students Against Dangerous Driving) which was run from the 10th-14th of September. 

### What Do You Know About eSports?

New teacher to College this year, and former student, Tom Kitchen, has provided this opportunity to interested Ashburton College students. Tom tells us that the eSports Club meets twice a week, Mondays and Fridays after school, for an hour and a half, to play the game League of Legends. The game is a team-based strategy game, with the goal being to work together as a team to bring down the enemy's base and destroy their 'nexus'. Essentially, players are trying to protect their base from the enemy and, at the same time, trying to attack their base. Before the game begins, players each choose a unique champion (character) to control for the whole game. Each champion is different and has different strengths and weaknesses, and it is important to communicate with team members as to what every person should choose to do. Additionally there are many smaller objectives on the map that a team can choose to fight around, to gain slight advantages on the enemy team. Most games last between 30-40 minutes and, as there are endless combinations of champions to pick, the game is never dull because each champion offers something different. At the eSports Club this year new players have been

taught the basics, and the more experienced players have offered workshops for the

College had a team of six people compete in the National High School League (HSL), playing one game a week on a Monday night against schools from all around the country. The team had mixed results in the first split (season) of this year, but it was also their first time competing so they weren't expected to do exceptionally well, but were pleased that the losses were really close games.

With one game live-streamed against Burnside High School, over 500 people watched the game live online around the world. This resulted in an eSports Director from the USA contacting the club because he was interested in some of the players, and was offering eSports (in the USA it is classed as an athletic activity) Scholarships to his College, Coker College in South Carolina. Scholarships are dependent on players gaining a sufficiently high ranking, having academic marks up to scratch and passing SAT exams, a standardised exam used for College entry in the USA. Two members from the eSports club, Callum Fuller and Daniel Petrie, have been offered conditional scholarships, and when they pass their SAT exams, they will be granted these. The scholarships are in the region of US\$20,000 a year minimum. The scholarships include representing Coker College's eSports team while studying there. Tom said that he is planning to start theory lessons that promote and teach the core values of on-line etiquette. These values are: teamwork, positive mindset, resilience, online behaviour, communication, respect, and many more. Essentially this covers all values that any other sports team would train/talk about. How Big is eSports? Last year's World Championships were held in the Beijing National Stadium (the Bird's Nest) used for the Olympics, and the venue was fully sold out. eSports is huge in Australia, where professional teams live together in apartments and train together and are supported by staff who undertake different managerial roles on aspects of the game, and the running of a normal sports establishment. In Australia and overseas, professional sports clubs from Football and the AFL are buying eSports teams, realising the potential of this fast-rising

e-Sports Tournament by Daniel Petrie For Ashburton College's newly formed eSports club, we decided to host a tournament. In order to do this our teacher, Mr Kitchen, contacted Riot Games (the creators of League of Legends) and organised this. Riot Games decided they would sponsor this event, by offering both in-game

rewards, and real-life prizes such as wristbands,

thundersticks, lanyards and stress balls. This tournament was conducted over a number of weeks and, within this timeframe, there were two different tournaments held - 1 v 1 and 5 v 5. During the 5 v 5 tournament, players learnt the value of teamwork and communication, akin to more traditional sports. It was shown that teams with greater communication, and an ability to work as a team, had far higher success throughout the tournament. The final game was conducted at College in the T5 computer lab during lunch time on Thursday 28 June, where we set up an open room in T4, so that any outside spectators were welcome to watch. The turnout was huge and the room filled up quickly. The aforementioned merchandise was also given out to all spectators who attended. The final game of the tournament ended in a hard-fought match, where victory could have gone either way. Mr Kitchen, provided the following information, saying - "I think this tournament was a huge success, with the students who participated having as much fun as the ones who watched. It was a great starting platform to something much bigger next year, hopefully!" Approximately fifty spectators packed themselves into Room T4 which added to the atmosphere waving the sponsored thunderstick items. The winning Grand Duellists team comprised of Year 13 students Callum Fuller, Zack Martin, Tom Suh, Daniel Petrie, Nick Eden and Mr Kitchen. The runners-up were Sinister Blades, team members: Zymon Mabanua, Brendan Fleming,

lan Jerao, Dredgewell Madla, Marc Calzada.

Eight teams of five contested the 5 v 5 competitions, inclusive of a teachers' team of Tom Kitchen, James Jenkinson, James Aulsford, Jason Vannini and Kyle Henderson. Team names were based off characters from the game, with the two finalist teams being the Grand Duellists and Sinister Blades, with the former taking out the win by being the first to destroy the enemy

### HSL (High School League):

This year, the eSports club entered a team into the national HSL (High School League) competition. We played on Monday evenings from the computer lab here at College. In split (season) one, the competition was split into two pools; Auckland, and then the rest of NZ. In this split, the competition was a Swiss format so we always got matched up with teams that had a similar win/loss record to us. Overall in our group, we finished 13/15 teams. We felt like some results just didn't go our way, but it was good to know most of the matches we played were really close and only came down to one mistake from the whole team. The finals of split one were played at the Sky Tower in Auckland and games were live streamed every week. We had one of our games streamed when we played against Burnside and it was also shown on Sky Sports.

Split two started in Term 3 and at the time of writing we have one loss and one win. The format this time is just regular group stage and

then knockout so no more coming up against teams with similar records. The competition has expanded to Australia now to include New South Wales, Queensland and Victoria. NZ is now its own region in the international tournament. We landed in a tough pool with 6 Auckland schools including last split winner Rangitoto College and semi finalists Tawa College from Wellington. The top two teams from each pool will advance to the knockout stages, and then the grand finals will be played from Riot HQ in Australia and streamed live.

### Lincoln exchange:

The eSports club sent two teams to Lincoln for the annual sports exchange. This was the first time that eSports was included. Ashburton had previous competitive experience through the HSL, but for Lincoln, this was their first time playing on the competitive scene. Ashburton came away comfortable winners on the day, both teams winning their best of 3 games 2-0.

On Saturday 14 April two College teams, Harriet Stock and Alex Jones, and Penny Stilgoe and Sam Corbett, competed in the TeenAg Section at the Aorangi Region Young Farmer of the Year Competition in Waimate. Competition was tough between the thirty eight teams competing from throughout the region. All competed in the eight modules of measuring stag heads, understanding NAIT (National Animal Identification and Tracing), sheep judging, safety around farm fuel stops, water capacity on fields, tractor use, fencing, general

knowledge quiz. The top teams took part in the Agricultural Knowledge Quiz, run in a buzzer style. The College students enjoyed the sheep judging and stag scoring the most.

Harriet and Alex placed second overall and now were one of the two teams to progress through to the Grand Final in Invercargill 05-07 July. TeenAg teacher Hayley Wards described this, rightly, as being 'very exciting'. The Geraldine High School team won the challenge. Hayley also said that the four students had spent a lot of time studying various matters agricultural,

including a lunchtime in the College Agriculture room measuring deer antlers (thanks to Ag teacher Stephen Millichamp).

Harriet, was also one of six TeenAg students from the Aorangi region selected to take part in a Raising the Standards Leadership Course held in Twizel from 16-18 April. The Course was run by New Zealand Young Farmers and funded by DairyNZ, with attendees staying at the Twizel Camping Ground. This event was South Islandbased, with six students also attending from each of the Tasman and Otago/Southland regions. In

the eighteen-strong group the gender balance was close to equal with ten females and eight males. Harriet said they formed a 'really good group, who got on well. TeenAg, established to introduce and promote a positive picture about agriculture and agricultural careers from an early age, is a part of the New Zealand Young Farmers national organisation. Harriet is a member of TeenAg at Ashburton College and it was through this that she was able to make application. Teacher Miss Wards has introduced this to Ashburton College students. The course, the first of three throughout New Zealand, was designed to enhance the skills of emerging leaders within TeenAg clubs. Harriet said the three day course was 'really cool'. Students were taught how to set goals, communicate, deal with conflict, run effective meetings and write a curriculum vitae. The overall emphasis was about working with other people. The three guest speakers were Marcia Green, Will Joicy and Bridget Roulston; a Shepherd, Vet and Farm Manager, who gave tips on their work, opportunities available, knowledge aspects and advice on how to be successful in achieving placements. Finding the course 'interesting and fun' Harriet referred to the personality test and which groups were best suited to types of roles, out of the owl, dove, peacock and eagle. The students learnt what was required to work with personality groups which weren't their own. She

said that there was quite a bit of time spent on how to run meetings, and dealing with conflict, and the guest speakers gave examples of some situations they had experienced and managed.

### TeenAg Young Farmers' National Final

Harriet and Alex, as regional competition second place-getters, travelled to Invercargill on 05 July to compete in the National TeenAg Finals. held from 05-07 July at Devon Park. The TeenAg Competition Series caters for all secondary school-aged students and showcases excellence in farming, business, and life skills. It also fosters personal growth and development amongst competitors, encourages learning by participation and is relevant for all skill levels! The TeenAg Competition Series consists of seven Regional Finals, with the top two teams in each region qualifying for the showcase event Grand Final. Once on-site the competitors, working in their teams of two, were exposed to two busy days, starting on Thursday night with an hour long 'exam' covering different agricultural sections: dairy, sheep, beef, forestry, soils, and a

financial section. Also required was an essay which Harriet and Alex 'did quite well' in, having written on the impact of Mycoplasma Bovis on the beef industry. Friday morning heralded in the practical aspects of the competition, in cold, wet conditions! Starting at 8:00am work began on their 'farmlet' where the tasks were to pull apart wooden pallets to build a chicken house; and build an electric fence which would allow an irrigator to go through. Following this start, the contestants gave a speech on the future of technology in agriculture before heading into the seven modules, of 15 minutes each.

Friday of the competition concluded with a return to the farmlet to complete their tasks. Harriet and Alex said they scored quite well on the chicken coop. Saturday brought about a 'day out' visiting a Southland Processing Plant working on year-round parsnips, and a Dairy Development Research farm. Both are very keen to return to the competition next year, with Alex indicating the whole process was interesting and saying that he 'learned as much on the day' as knew in total beforehand. Harriet said winners St Bede's College from Christchurch were very good and deserved their first placing. Two North Island teams, Napier Boys' High School and Fielding High School, claimed second and third placings; while Harriet and Alex were a creditable 8th from the fourteen competing teams. Ashburton contestants performed well with the Ashburton Intermediate School team placing first in the Agri-kids competition. As Year 11 (Alex) and Year 12 (Harriet) students, a return next year is attainable, and both students said this year's experiences would be invaluable in the 2019 competition series.

# Canterbury Secondary Schools Chess Competition 2018

The annual Canterbury Chess Competition 2018 took place during Term 2. College had two teams competing, one in each of the two grades. The teams travelled every Thursday evening to Christchurch to play at Canterbury Chess Club

The A Grade team of Chrizia Cayanan, Keno De Leon, Aidan Soal and Brendan Fleming turned around last year's results and finished second overall, after finishing first and unbeaten in round robin play. Unfortunately they lost out to Burnside in the final. All four players contributed to a very good season.

Match results were: vs CBHS 3.5 - .5 Win, Burnside A 3 - 1 Win, Burnside B 3 - 1 Win and St Bedes 3 - 1 Win. In the Final we went down 1 - 3 to Burnside A.

The B Grade team of Andrew Phimester, Henry Chapman, Jonathan Cabanatan, Zymon Magbanua and Rob Corbett produced some great results overall and stormed to victory. Again, all the the players contributed well, but most impressive was the performance of new player, Zymon, who won all his games. Notably the B team played against the A team from 5 of the competing schools.

Match results were: vs St Andrews A 3–1 Win, Riccarton A 3–1 Win, Christ College A 3–1 Win, Cashmere A 3–1 Win, Lincoln A 3–1 Win, CBHS B 4–0 Win, Burnside C 2–2 Draw. In the Final the team repeated its 3–1 win over 2nd placed Lincoln HS.

### Interschools

The College played two inter-schools this year against Burnside and Lincoln High School.

In the match against Burnside a weakened A team went down 3–13 and a similarly weaker B team lost 3.5–12.5. These results were totally at odds to the Canterbury Championship games and showed that Burnside does indeed have strength in depth.

The match against Lincoln went our way 25 – 11. Aidan scored 5/6 points, whilst Brendan, Henry, Andrew, Rob and Chirag Mehta all scored 4/6.

# Christchurch Chess Power Championship

Eight players headed north to compete in these championships. A Swiss system that kept our own players apart from each other led to some interesting pairings and it meant that many players ended up on the same points with final

placings determined by a countback system. Our top four players scored enough points for the team to finish first overall. Brendan was our top individual performer with 7/7 and first place finish. Chrizia won the award for top female, scoring 6.5/7. Aidan and Andrew both scored 6/7, Rob 4/7. Zymon was disappointed with his 3/7, the same as newcomer to competitive chess, Simon Aiken-Wheeler, and Ted Yee finished on 2/7.

### South Island Championship

This event was held at the Ashburton Intermediate School. Ashburton College went into the games reasonably confident after a good showing in qualification.

There were six teams involved in a five round round-robin tournament lasting just over four hours.

College started strongly with a 9-1 win over St Bedes and a 8-2 victory over Logan Park HS from Dunedin.

The third match was against Burnside, who had pipped College for the Canterbury title earlier in the year. This game was closer bur still resulted in a win to Burnside 3-7.

Next up was defending S.I. Champion Otago Boys' HS, who had had three 10-0 whitewashes so far. Digging deep College managed to gain a 5-5 result, inflicting what proved to be OBHS's worst result of the day.

In the final round Ashburton cruised to a 10-0 win over Christchurch Boys' HS, securing second equal place and matching last year's result.

Our best game of the tournament was Aidan Soal's victory on Board One against OBHS and best individual performer was Keno De Leon who won all 5 of his games. Aidan finished with 2.5/5, Brendan Fleming scored 3.5/5 and Chrizia Cavanan 3/5



The activities included a treasure hunt, poetry/song writing, cake-baking and NCEA interaction opportunities, as well as the chance to watch a full-length German movie in one sitting! This was a first time invitation for the College and was so successful that we hope it will be repeated next year.

### PASCH MINT (STEM) Course, Jakarta, Indonesia

During the January holidays, Jed Cameron and Jonty Small spent five days working on Physics as part of this MINT course along with 189 other German learning students from all over the ASEAN region. # JAPANESE STUDIES

They had a guest speaker, Maha Sun, who studied Japanese at high school and the university. She was selected to study abroad for one year at Japan's prestigious Waseda University Tokyo and now she is moving to Japan Students involved

in practising a Japanese dance as well. In July, we hosted twenty-four Japanese students from our sister school Tokorozawa Kita High Shcool. We have over twenty years of relationship. Our lovely host families looked after the students and they made uncountable and unforgettable memories with their host families and Ashburton College students and all

In contacting Ashburton



The NZ team finished 3rd, just 1 point behind Victoria with Queensland the convincing winners.

#### Triathlon





In July, Matthew Clough headed to Denmark to compete at the ITU World Multisport Championships. Matthew was selected into the New Zealand teams in both the U19 Cross Triathlon and Aquathlon.

The Cross Tri was the first event, held in Svenborg. This consisted of a 1km open water swim in the harbour, followed by a technical 28km mountain bike ride mostly on single tracks through the forest, and ending with a tight and technical 10.5km trail run through the forest and alongside the harbour.

Going in to the trail run, Matthew managed to reduce the margin by 1 minute after the first lap. However, the energy expended on the mountain bike left him with little left in the tank and he had to fight hard to complete the second lap. Matthew finished in second place in 2 hours 29 minutes 25 seconds.

Two days later, the U19 Aquathlon event was held in Middelfart. This consisted of a 1km open

water swim through the estuary and marina, followed by a 5km run through local streets.

There was a large field in this event and once again, the water was plagued with jellyfish. Matthew emerged from the swim in 5th place but had a particularly fast transition and was soon chasing down the race leaders.

Matthew had the

fastest run of the day in his age group but could not quite catch the leader. He finished in second place in 31 minutes 25 seconds, just 7s behind the winner.


As the magazine goes to print, Matthew will be heading to the World XTERRA Championships in Maui in October.

# Canterbury Secondary Schools' Road Race



With 5 boys in Year 13, there is a definite need for new recruits next year.


#### Smallbore Rifle Shooters

Top Co-ed School and Seventh Overall Placing: From these strong results, Ashburton College concluded the regatta with a total of twenty one points, placing it seventh overall on the points table, only three points behind Waikato Diocesan School, four behind Rangi Ruru Girls' School and seven behind fourth placed Christ's College. The top three teams were St Peter's School, Cambridge; Hamilton Boys' High

events, training and racing, each student had homework to complete throughout the week, which they did. As always, weather had an impact, with windy conditions on the Monday and again on Tuesday, resulting in changes to race times and only a four minute gap between each race. Wednesday's weather 'performed' but by Thursday conditions were wet and cold, and racing placed on hold. The impacts of this for all were significant, with Jayne giving the example of the Girls' Under 17 Coxed Quadruple Sculls having been at the lake since 6:30am waiting for the conditions to change. At 11:00am there was a glimpse of hope when the racing was taken off hold, but only for 20 minutes! Finally, at 6:00pm, racing was back on, with some teams rushing from Twizel to get there in time. Numbers at the lake went from approximately 100 people to around 2000 within minutes. To their great credit, the College Quad won that quarterfinal to head into the semi-finals on Friday. On Saturday, College had six boats heading to A Finals and three to B Finals.

New Zealand and South Island Rowing Trials: With Maadi completed, Jayne said that rowers looked forward to a break – but not for some, as Sunday morning following Maadi Cup brought exciting trials news. Veronica Wall and Mollie Gibson were named as New Zealand Junior Triallists, and Emma Stagg as South Island triallist. For Emma, this meant a return to Lake

Ruataniwha on Friday 13 until Sunday 15 April. Emma was unsucessful in making the team, but learned a lot from the experience.

On-going, solid and targeted training regime paid off for College rowers Mollie Gibson and Veronica Wall, with selection to compete at the World Junior Rowing Championships from 08-12 April. Mollie and Veronica joined approximately forty other youth rowers from around New Zealand, for trials held at Lake Karapiro from 14-20 April. They all stayed in the Rob Waddell Lodge, with a local parents' group responsible for the catering. They flew up


undertook the all important 2000m erg test on the Sunday, with Mollie saying her result was her personal best erg test. Both the rowers' times and their power to weight ratio results are taken into selection account. With wind putting paid to rowing on the Monday, it was Tuesday before seatracing took place. In this process rowers

are put in different boats, with one person swapped at a time in order to determine which combinations produce the fastest time. This exercise was repeated Wednesday and Thursday. The outcomes of the trials are announced at the end of the camp, with twenty of the original forty rowers successful. Mollie, in her first year at this level, was named in a squad of six, from which the rowers were placed in the Quad or Double. Mollie said the outcome for her was 'really exciting' and she was 'pretty stoked'. Both rowers located to Cambridge on 03 June to train as a team in readiness to leave for the Czech Republic, and the town Racice where racing took place.

Veronica's father, and very successful coach, Justin Wall, was at the camp also, with Coaches Logan Keys from Christchurch (Boys' Sweep Coach), Duncan By-de-ley from Tauranga (Boys' Scull Coach) and Nick Barton from Waikato (Girls' Sweep Coach). The two disciplines are different in that the 'sweep' is one oar per rower, while the 'sculls' are two oars per rower. Veronica was selected as a single sculler, having been selected into a doubles boat last year. She noted that it can be very valuable in the first year of junior selection to be in a team as it is a big experience and can be daunting at a first international regatta. In a team boat, there is much to be learnt from those who are older, have had some experience and there is the benefit of team unity.

This was Veronica's last year at junior level, with Under 18 being the upper age group, before rowers context the Under 23 level.


