History Informs the Future

An important part of the new school year is also to reflect on last year's achievements, to see how we as a College did, and how we can improve this year. To work as a team with parents and caregivers, parents need information from College so they can support their child at home.

Reporting Starts 14 March

We will continue this year with one full written report to all students -Years 11, 12 and 13 at the end of Term 3, and Years 9 and 10 at the end of Term 4. To complement this report, staff will continue with the fortnightly report, reflecting on how well students are working towards our College Values of 'Achieve Quality' and 'Have Respect'. These will be published each fortnight via the Parent Portal, starting Friday 14 March.

Attendance An issue that can slow and sometimes stop success is NON-ATTENDANCE. Evidence indicates that a student is at risk of not achieving if their attendance in the classroom is less than 85%. There are 31 days left this term, 48 in Term 2, 49 in Term 3 and 13 days in Term 4. This is a total of 141 days left for senior students to be in the classroom learning before NCEA examinations start!

The message, especially for senior students, is to maximise their time in the classroom from Day 1, Term 1, as 07 November 2019 - the first day of NCEA examinations - will be here for many, sooner than they want.

Overseas Experiences for Students

A number of College students have recently returned from overseas experiences of varying lengths and, in following newsletters, we will look at what these students gained and enjoyed while away.

Leanne Walsh Returns from Austria

Through the company Your Education, who talked with students last year at Ashburton College, Leanne visited and stayed in upper Austria, near the city of Linz. Leaving New Zealand on 08 December Leanne was into schooling during her summer holiday break which, of course, became a

Application for this experience was by way of interview with the Canterbury Area Representative, from Christchurch, plus the customary form-filling including a summary of why Leanne was seeking this experience.

Leanne said she had some travel experience, having been in Europe about three years ago, and Australia on occasions with family.

While in Austria she lived in the town of Altenfelden, a small town very similar to Hinds where she hails from. There she lived with host parents and a host sister. She also had a host brother but he was generally away in Vienna. School was in Linz, approximately 40km away by bus.

Leanne said the experience was 'cool – literally and figuratively', and her host family 'really awesome' and supportive. While there, she had trips to Vienna, Salzburg and Hallstatt, mostly exploring the area and 'quite often' trying the cuisine. She said that Hallstatt was a very scenic place, and very old.

very few takeaway venues and only four KFC outlets in the whole country. Families eat a lot of home-made food, a lot of soup and appear to have an overall healthier diet, although there were plenty of desserts and pastries which were more prevalent than in New Zealand. Leanne suggested she was going to try and keep up with food similar to what she ate in Austria. Schooling was another area of difference, being 'completely different'. Instead of NCEA, students study for Matura and must compulsorily stay in schooling until they are nineteen years of age. The length of the school day changes daily, for example, at the school Leanne was at students finished around 3:30pm on a Monday, whereas Tuesday and Wednesday was around 1:30pm; Thursday and Friday around 12 noon and just prior to. The day started earlier than here, at 8:00am. Students still moved from subject to subject, had slightly shorter teaching periods than here (50-55 minutes), had shorter breaks overall, but had five minute breaks between subjects. A school of about 200 students, it was quite a sports-focused school, with sports classes held at the end of each day on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

one stage, Leanne gave a presentation about New Zealand to students and their teacher.

Leanne found the language difference a bit challenging to start with and said she started reading Mangas, a Japanese comic book written in German!). German was the key language, with challenges around different dialects. Students were quite good English speakers, making conversation reasonably straightforward.

Leanne's wise advice to other students considering such an opportunity is to 'do it' if they feel they can both raise the necessary money, as this option is
