PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



The highlight of our year was undoubtedly the visit of Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern to Ashburton College on Thursday 14 March, accompanied by the Minister of Education, Chris Hipkins.

The purpose of their visit was to announce an almost total rebuild of our campus, due to recognition that our current buildings are no longer fit for purpose and, because of their concrete block construction, they cannot be remodelled. The other factor is that the Ministry of Education has predicted significant roll growth over the next ten years. We always knew the Minister of Education was due to attend to make the announcement but, with two weeks to go, it became apparent that the Prime Minister would also attend. I chose to keep her arrival as a secret from our staff and students. Jacinda was as personable and engaging in person as she appears to be on television.

Of course, the tragic events of the following day on 15 March revealed how empathetic and supportive she was, as she led our country through the impact of the Mosque shooting.

This year has seen Ashburton College make two significant changes to our curriculum. The first of these was the creation of Ako time. This is one hour of allocated time where staff and students can work together to develop the skills and dispositions needed for the future. These include the need to be a creative problem-solver who can think, work with others, and be a resilient communicator. This time aims to have, where possible, the same teacher supporting a student as they move through the College and the challenges inherent of the teenage years.

The second change was the introduction of the Innovation Stream at Year 9 level. This involved three teachers from different subject areas working in collaboration, as opposed to the traditional secondary school model of learning in subject silos. Because of our College's size we have been able to make the option of traditional

or innovation as a choice for both learners and staff. This will be expanded to include Year 9 and Year 10 in 2020. Of course, any new-style teaching will have some restrictions because it will be happening in the traditional single cell classrooms until more flexible spaces become available as a result of our rebuild.

As with any large secondary school there is always a huge range of sporting and cultural activities on offer. In sports we have all the major sporting codes covered but also new sports being introduced such as golf croquet and e-sports. At our recent Aoraki Region Sports Awards we had athletes nominated in seventeen different sports. To be nominated as a finalist requires a student to be a regional or national representative.

On the cultural front we were again involved in an enormous array of events, both within our College and within the region. We always have a number of cultural events including AshDance, Lip Sync, Red Carpet Evening, Music Evening and the Open Mic lunchtime concerts, and our Polyfest and Kapa Haka performances.

Again there were two cultural highlights for me. The first of these was our performance of High School Musical. This was far better than any movie and the enjoyment of the whole crew and cast demonstrated the power of co-operation. The second highlight was the recent fundraising concert for André. All the performers were either current or former students and the standard was amazing, which again demonstrates the level of music capability within our College.

Ashburton College is blessed with the level of community and parental support we enjoy. This support enables all sorts of extras that are not available through normal government funding, and this extra support manifests itself in many ways.

Advance Ashburton funds a Learning Support Assistant in our Kōhanga Programme, and also towards our Reading Mentors' programme. Many service groups support individual or group applications. The district's rowing facilities, programme and equipment levels, are the envy of many elsewhere and this is made possible by the level of community support. However, our students also are very keen to help themselves. This year our Classics students went to Italy and Greece, our German students were in Germany, our Japanese scholars were in Japan and the forty five members of Phoenix Rising completed their biennial South Island tour. For all these events our students got after-school and holiday jobs and were involved in all manner of

fundraising ventures. Clearly they had taken on that valuable real-world message of 'if it's going to be, it's up to me'.

Finally can I acknowledge all staff who are leaving us and wish them well. We have about 150 staff and have the usual round of retirements, promotions, pregnancies and movement to other towns. My thanks to all of them.

There are three staff members who deserve extra recognition - Mr Mark (Chalky) Gleason is leaving Ashburton College after 49 years of teaching. Former Office Manager and latterly NCEA Co-ordinator Nola Smitheram has retired after thirty five years' service and Canteen Manager Brenda Beach after thirty two years. We wish them all a long and happy retirement!

The Ministry of Education is giving Ashburton College reasonable scope to build a school that suits our students and community, even while we must stick to a budget. Teaching Staff

Outside of the classroom the Year 9 Boys' Cricket team benefited from his coaching, which was another indicator of his willingness to become involved in the life and work of the College. She was a person willing to involve herself fully in the life and work of the College, appreciated by students and staff alike. Long-Serving Staff Leavers

As for each year a number of staff were farewelled with absolute acknowledgement of their sterling contributions including those of three very long-serving staff who had committed the greater part of their working lives, energy and expertise to Ashburton College. They are missed for their quality service to students, staff and the workplace and for who they are as people.

Between this year's long-serving staff leavers an amazing total of 116 years of experience, institutional knowledge, contributions and collegial friendships were farewelled.

Some key aspects of all that they gave to the life and work of the College were -

Mark Gleason - Mark is an Ashburton College legend!



A mere 49 years ago he began at Ashburton College, at a time of additional 'new' buildings on-site at a 'new' Ashburton College, and straight out of Teachers' College.

Mark advised in his application that he was interested in most sports but especially softball, basketball and athletics – all of which he became involved in, coaching girls' and boys' softball teams for over twenty years and numerous basketball teams, amongst other contributions. Up to this year's final Student Executive v Staff Chess Match, Mark has consistently been the 'King' player.

His initial appointment was as Assistant Teacher of History, English and Social Studies. Since then subjects have included 'Liberal' Studies; General Studies; responsibility for/teaching of students with Specific Learning Difficulties; responsibilities for Curriculum Development / Associate Health Co-ordinator; Head of Department History; and Associate Head of Social Science Faculty. It must be said here, too, that numerous students of History have enjoyed the long-standing Akaroa Field Trip, organised by Mark with department staff.

Mark developed the 'new' New Zealand Law programme, introducing it to Ashburton College in his early years here and, as he retires from his now part-time position, he is still a teacher of Law and History, at Year 13 level.

Extra-curricular portfolios included 'Sports Master' of Blue House for four years; Secretary and Chairperson of a regional committee to organise in-service courses; School Certificate and University Entrance exam marker. Mark chaired a committee, under the general supervision of the Director-General of Education, to evaluate and develop the new junior school curriculum; and was also involved in preparation of a new health syllabus. Over the

years Mark was a member of a number of in-College standing committees.

As a person, Mark held a fundamental educational philosophy of equality of opportunity for all students, and held a significant interest in and support for students with learning challenges. This pastoral care for others meant he was highly effective as a Family Form teacher, and also as a Tutor (Dean) for a period of time.

Mark was a respected and capable teacher, affectionately known as 'Chalky' Gleason by his students! He had an excellent rapport with his students and a consistent ability to gain a winwin situation, without confrontation.

This same ability to create a win-win situation was evident throughout his lengthy term, since 1987, as Chairperson of the Ashburton College Branch of the NZ PPTA (the Post Primary Teachers' Association – or Teachers' Union), and Regional Executive member. Mark has been a steadfast voice of balanced reason in this role, enabling understanding of both a schools' perspective and the rights of a staff member. Throughout he has been a sound and trusted reference person for both legalities and rights, and has aided sensible, balanced negotiations.

Mark's outstanding and respected contribution to so many facets of Ashburton College life is epitomised by the words: 'a man with empathy for others and a high level of rapport with students and staff, Mark's quiet low-key approach masks a keen intelligence, and a very professional, competent manner as a teacher, with a real ability to enable others to develop and take some lead – whether staff or students.' We farewelled a fine person and teacher, known for being non-judgemental, one who demonstrated loyalty and discretion, was a careful listener and diplomatic in response. Mark is widely respected by both students and staff, and is a person of total integrity.

Mark was wished well in retirement, and for enjoyment of the increased flexibility of time that retirement should bring, with wife Lesley, family members, friends and for activities of interest.

Nola Smitheram

Nola was an integral and valued part of Ashburton College's life and work for an impressive 35 years and five months, and we recognise, with significant appreciation, her truly impressive level of input and quality of work which included regular contact with generations of students, families and staff.

Nola was originally a student at Ashburton College and this association with the College

was then followed by her lengthy employment here which began with a clerical role in the Student Office in 1971, for two years. This time, interestingly, coincided with the first wave of students arriving on to the current College site.

After a stint in Gisborne, and employment in Methven, Ashburton College became Nola's work place environment from 1986 on when



she was employed, in the terminology of the era, as an 'ancillary clerical worker' in the Student Office

Part-time employment quickly morphed into 30 hours a week from 1987, as Registrar through until 1999, then to the renamed position of Office Manager. Throughout her time in the position Nola was accurately described as self-motivated, effective, efficient, accurate and having an indispensable knowledge of the Registrar role. This was a position which held multiple tasks, time and complexity demands; and, with numerous interruptions, it required a strength of focus.

As a natural progression of her sporting interests and abilities, Nola also organised the College student ski trips for many years.

At the end of 2011 Nola reverted to part-time hours and continued employment managing the NCEA Co-ordinator aspect of her Office Manager role, and added to it the SAC (Special Assessment Conditions) Co-ordinator and Reader-Writer Co-ordinator roles.


Nola then decided, after giving all of these years to College, that it was time to pursue other activities without the constraints of employment commitments.

Officially, Nola's resignation took place in July 2019 but she continued to assist the College, as we transitioned her role, by retaining the Exam Centre Manager aspect to see the College through the end-of-year NCEA exam season. With these duties now completed, her time

with College as a staff member has officially concluded.

Brenda Beach - Brenda Beach started as Canteen Manager in September 1987 and since then cheerfully served three generations of students, organised student canteen helpers and their contracts, and rostered in a band of supportive volunteer adult assistants over the years



Some food styles have changed over the years, which Brenda and the Student Canteen Committee Members adapted to, with these changes receiving the Heart Foundation Silver Award status.

Consider this – on a daily basis making and selling, for example: 24 garlic rolls, 54 sausage rolls of different varieties, 29 hot dogs, 53 wraps, 20 chicken nugget rolls, 27 panini, 28 quarter-pounders, 185 wontons, and 97 pies of different flavours. This total of around 470 items per day

is only a sample of what is made in the College Canteen. Multiply that by five days a week and we have an absolute minimum of 2,350 items per week. Multiply that by 40 weeks a year for thirty two years and one term – well, we'll leave you to work that maths out.

Added to Brenda's portfolios was excellent catering preparation for a variety of College functions and, last year, she added judge of the Waiata competition to her list of capabilities!

Brenda has given huge loyalty to Ashburton College, professional service, a willingness to make changes, and a positive cheerful presence on campus – to students and staff alike. As with all of our long-serving leavers, Brenda has become an integral part of the College campus and, without a doubt, her presence, efficiencies and experience will be hugely missed when we come to 2020 without her in the Canteen and around the College.

Maureen was wished well for her new business venture.

Jules Townsend headed the departure process this term, after having started at Ashburton College, as a teacher of Mathematics, at the beginning of Term 3 2017.

While with us Jules became involved in the life of the College, making good contributions to the Mathematics Department, recognised as a hard worker. Good relationships with students and staff were a feature of his time here, as was his co-ordination of the popular lunchtime club 'Magic the Gathering'.

Jules left College in order to travel overseas to support family members. A look into 2019 Staff Notes will show that Jules returned again though!

Meanwhile **Amanda Hewson**, valued teacher of Social Studies, History and Classical Studies since October 2011 uplifted her maternity leave entitlement at the start of Term Four.

Zahra Gilson held two positions at College, from the end of March 2016. Initially this was as a Library Assistant, being a qualified librarian, and latterly as a Counsellor. Zahra undertook her counsellor trainee year at College during 2017 and was then employed as a qualified Counsellor in 2018, while continuing some cover work in the library also.

Zahra was notable for her enthusiasm, passion for her roles and students' welfare and progress, and for being a determined advocate for students. Both the library and counselling staff described Zahra as having strengths in engaging with students, and, as a librarian, was dedicated, knowledgeable and giving of energy to support students' learning. Zahra's 'joie de vivre', hardworking nature, commitment to the

promotion of literature and literacy and creative initiative will be much missed by the library team.

Similarly, Zahra was described as a pleasure to have in the counselling team, where she was appreciated as a huge asset and fun to work with. Zahra left College to focus on establishing her private practice.

As is often the case at the end of a year, we farewell a number of valued staff, inclusive of long-serving leavers as well as those who had been with us for a shorter time.

Long-Serving Leavers

The three long-serving staff leavers, like many before them, committed the greater part of their working lives, energy and knowledge to Ashburton College. We remain indebted to their sterling contributions. It is one thing to be in a workplace for a long time, but it is quite another to offer quality service and make a difference to students, staff and the workplace over this time. We thank these staff members for this, and, most importantly, for who they have been as people. They will be missed but are wished well in their future endeavours. Between these staff members a total of 75 years (and 8 months!) was farewelled. Years of experience, institutional knowledge, contributions to students and collegial friendships. While it is impossible to cover all of the contributions of each staff member, we do highlight some key aspects of all that they have given to the life and work of the College.

The College's best of wishes went with Joan Pow and Ken Pow for a wonderful 'next phase' of life a little distance away from Ashburton, in Lincoln, ready to enjoy more flexible timeframes to spend with family, friends and indulging in interests. In January 2019 Claire Robertshaw began a new role at Rolleston College, to College's loss and Rolleston's gain.

Ken Pow - Delving into the archives uncovered some telling descriptors of Ken's capabilities and interests, all of which were to form the superb contributor he became at Ashburton College.

His degree papers highlighted French, German, Russian and History passes; he was prepared in his new school to be involved in sport, drama and language clubs; way back in December 1974-March 1975 he lived with a German family and attended school there as part of the NZ-German Exchange scheme.

In 1979-1980, after three years at Otago University, and through the German Academic Exchange Service he obtained a full scholarship to study at a University in West Germany as it was then known; he had a background of interests (or fanatical obsessions some might say) in football, coaching football, badminton, junior cricket coaching, interests in golf, chess and was involved in the University German Department production.



This same person was described in his Teachers' College citation as intelligent, tactful, hardworking, conscientious, quick and co-operative, when he graduated with distinction from Christchurch Teachers' College.

This is a very good summary of the Ken Pow we knew and who gave hugely of his significant expertise, enthusiasm, talents and positivity to three generations of students, families and staff at College, and through many of the categories listed above.

First employed at Ashburton College in 1982, as a teacher of German and English, Ken now completes thirty eight years of superbly committed years to College.

Ken, appointed as Head of Languages in 1999, was a highly regarded, effective and motivational teacher and Family Form teacher; a passionate advocate for language learning; a supportive colleague; sports teams' coach; chess guru and College Chess team coach extraordinaire; a 'Form 4' North School Tutor; a Dean; College Curriculum, Computer, Pastoral, Finance and Promotions Committee member; organiser for Arts and Languages week. Ken was staff Head of Orange House from 1994 until the end of 2001, while in November of 1993 he was appointed to a new position for the College – that of Director of Foreign Students as it was then known.

Ken held this busy position until relinquishing it from January 2012. In this time, and remaining, sister school relationships with Germany and Japan were established; what have become biennial German School tours were effectively spearheaded and managed by Ken; overseas

marketing was undertaken; AFS Scholarships and exchanges have been on offer to students. Ashburton College is one of only five schools in New Zealand which is a part of the PASCH partnership, the 'Schools: Partners for the Future' initiative, a global network of some 1800 schools that place a high value on German language and culture. Through Ken Pow's drive, initiative – and willingness to sit an exam! – College students have gained innumerable international exchange and scholarship opportunities.

No citation would be complete without reference to the annual end-of-year College chess match (aka - camouflage for a water fight), and Ken's long-term organisation of same. It was very apt to have his honourable appointment this year to 'making the staff moves' as a long-serving, retiring staff member.

Joan Pow - a quiet but firm, often unsung, supportive and effective staff member, Joan started at Ashburton College in April 1998, as a Teacher Aide in the Student Learning Support Unit, a position she held for four years until April 2002.



Many of the students Joan worked with lacked confidence, had low self-esteem, short attention spans and consequently a range of behaviour needs. Joan was described as having the essential personal qualities needed for such a role. She was referred to as a 'very special person' who demonstrated genuine empathy and concern for, and extreme patience with, students.

In April 2002, looking to a fresh challenge, Joan changed to a position new to the College at that time, as International Programmes Support Staff member. In this role Joan worked alongside International students, supporting English Language teaching staff during class time, and International students in non-English as Second Language classes, in International Family Form, and assisting with the Department's administrative tasks.

It was a role ideally suited to her skills, and one which she retained for fourteen years, until the end of 2016. Over the last two years, until her decision to retire at the end of this year, Joan continued to work part-time, supporting ESOL students within classrooms.

Claire Robertshaw - Eighteen years ago Claire started at Ashburton College, as a teacher of Art with Art History, in what was to become a successful teaching career, to the benefit of many students and their results, including at Scholarship level.



Constantly striving to increase her teaching effectiveness has always come first for Claire, setting high standards for students and always working to find motivational ways of engaging and growing student capability.

As both a colleague and teacher Claire was approachable, friendly and warm-hearted, working in the classroom to engender an atmosphere of respect for others and valuing individuality, with a recognised cultural sensitivity and ability to form positive relationships with and understanding of students.

Strengths in Te Reo and tikanga, participation in Maori cultural events and developing an understanding of protocol were an early-career decision based on a desire to learn the correct language and terminology specific to the teaching of Visual Arts.

Claire was a strong advocate of the Peer Support Programme, always co-operatively supportive of colleagues and has contributed significantly to the extra-curricular life and work of the College – including such events as: AshDance, Lip Sync, Pasifika activities, Kapa Haka and Manu Korero; College productions, including sets and props; Arts and Languages week; Field Trips; Music Nights; and promoting the Arts through students' involvement in Mid Canterbury Schools' exhibitions, the College Art Award,

Zonta Art Award and Arts Festivals.

Many of the murals at College are due to the creativity, vision of and planning by Claire and the Art Department, providing students with 'real' Art opportunities. These major projects have extended to community murals also in town.

Claire involved herself in many of the College committees and was in the busy but enjoyable staff Head of Blue House role from 2004 until the end of 2010.

In 2003 Claire was appointed as Head of Department, Visual Arts; and in 2007 was appointed Head of the Arts and Languages Faculty, a position she held until finishing at College. During part of Term One and all of Term Two 2016 Claire was appointed to the position of Acting Deputy Principal.

Claire was successful in gaining a Secondary Teachers' Study Award in 2014, her purpose for which were the topics of Visual Art Education, education issues amongst Pasifika peoples in New Zealand and cultural differences in education.

Claire has given a huge amount of time, expertise, care, concern and collegiality to Ashburton College and has been greatly missed.

Additional Leaving Staff were -

Bridget Prendergast - a valued teacher of English and staff member who first started at College in July 2001, continuing until the end of 2008, when she had two years away from teaching. Bridget has since returned to College at various stages: fixed-term for Term One 2010, cover teacher 2014, a long-term relieving position in 2015, continuing into part-time hours from then until the end of this year.

Bridget contributed knowledgeably and valuably to curriculum leadership in the English Faculty, and was well-recognised as a strong classroom practitioner and a valued colleague who would be missed on campus by students and staff alike. Bridget took her considerable skills, empathy and quietly considerate approach to a position as teacher of the Southern Regional Health School, from where links with College are still maintained and new links forged with other schools.

Nicole Kilbride - came to Ashburton College at the start of 2017, as a new teacher (of English) who was a real asset to the College. Nicole involved herself in the life and work of the College, including re-instigating the art of debating to the benefit of the good number of students who became involved and were successful in the Christchurch-based events.

Nicole's subject expertise and perceptive contributions to Faculty discussions was missed, but she went with our good wishes for her new permanent position teaching English at Linwood College.

Alice Nash - a very capable teacher, Alice was described as an absolute boon to the Science Faculty and a fantastic teacher of Senior Biology. Alice stepped into the role of teacher-in-charge of Biology with confidence, supporting staff, and students' learning, and introducing new aspects to junior teaching.

Alice is also known for her love of animals, and classroom rabbit, Attenburrow! We were very sorry to lose Alice but wished her well in her new position at Rolleston College, which lessened her daily Christchurch to Ashburton commute, and where she was appointed to lead their senior Science programme and supporting assessments for their first Year 11 intake, which made this a position of significant opportunity.

Pieter Burger - an experienced teacher who was in a long-term relieving position this year, in the Social Sciences Faculty as a teacher of Geography, Social Studies and Money

Management. Pieter was eager to contribute to the Faculty with his time and energy valued. We appreciated Pieter's input, and hard work, and wished him well in the future.

James Jenkinson – James commenced at Ashburton College at the beginning of 2017, having returned to New Zealand from teaching overseas. He has been a very strong, positive, willing and cheerful contributor, as a teacher of English, and also to the wider life of the College. He was very quickly manoeuvred into the editorial role of the annual Phoenix Magazine production, a time-consuming but important role which he undertook with zeal, energy and capability. Further to this James held the positions of Pasifika Events Support Coordinator, Under 15 Rugby Boys' Team Manager and, in 2018, appointment as Year 10 Dean.

His work in all areas has been appreciated by both students and colleagues and, certainly, in a short time James has contributed most effectively, positively and significantly across many areas of College life. He will be much missed for all he has given and for himself as a person, but we did wish him well in his new

position at St Andrew's College, Christchurch.

Resignation from Head of Faculty position

Liz Cabout - acknowledged, with considerable appreciation, was Liz Cabout who made the decision to step down from her Head of Faculty Mathematics position, which she has held for ten years. Liz is a quietly conscientious leader, considerate and supportive of staff, passionate about the importance of Mathematics in learning and, with Faculty members, evaluating future options and approaches to engage students. To our good fortune Liz continues as a teacher of Mathematics.

AMAZING EXPERIENCE FOR TEACHER IN ISRAEL

Teacher Greta Hampton was successful in gaining a scholarship for three weeks during the January 2019 holiday period, to study at the Yad Vashem International School of Holocaust Studies. Jerusalem.

The scholarship opportunity was available through the Holocaust Centre of New Zealand, via their Outreach Programme, which Ashburton College students are a part of. Funding is made by the Holocaust Centre and Jewish benefactors, world-wide.

In October 2016 Greta also had the opportunity, through the Asia Foundation New Zealand, to travel to Korea to learn about their culture and history.

Greta, Specialist Classroom Teacher and Teacher of History and Classics, described the Jerusalem experience as awesome and amazing, and one from which she learnt a lot, saying she was excited to implement what she learnt into the curriculum and classroom.

While at Yad Vashem, amid winter and snow, and with the group of thirty one teachers from New Zealand, undertaken were lectures in Jewish History, learning more about the roots of anti-Semitism, pre-war Jewish life, Hitler's persecution of the Jews and the 'final solution' – the Holocaust.

Additionally the group was able to visit historically significant sites in Israel, including the old city in Jerusalem, Nazareth, the Sea of Galilee, the borders between Syria and Lebanon, the West Bank and the Dead Sea.

Greta said the information was often quite overwhelming and emotionally draining, but a highlight was meeting Jewish survivors, both children who had survived and a couple who were on Schindler's actual list and were saved by Schindler. In this case, set to be deported to Auschwitz, Schindler was able to 'do a deal' for women on the train, having them brought back to work in a factory.

Greta felt very humbled to be able to share in their experiences, and is committed to the need to help spread tolerance of others, saying how fortunate we are to live where we do, have the societies we have, and the opportunities that are available. Such experiences and information heightens one's perspective on life, endorsing the importance of family, friends and good health

As the horror of the Holocaust years become more distant, Greta said its significance is still important. The lessons learnt apply to the modern world – regarding discrimination, the resurgence of anti-semitism, the injustices still happening and the importance of being up-standers not tolerating prejudice and discrimination. There are lessons for us all, across the board.

A Colours Award is recognised as the most prestigious of the Awards process. Colours Awards are presented to students who are National Champions or who have been selected for a National Sports Team or are a member of a National Cultural Group.

Unlike the Blues Award the Colours Awards are not confined solely to Ashburton College-based activities. Students who receive a Colours Award do not receive a Blues Award.

BLUES AWARDS

In establishing Award recipients, each sport has specific criteria that is used as a guide for nominators. A select committee then discusses the nominations and makes final decisions. As a general rule Blues Awards are awarded to senior student, with the exception being when a junior student competes with distinction in senior or open events, or a performance by a junior student in a junior event that would place them in a top finish had they been competing in a senior event.

PERFORMANCE AWARDS

Performance Awards recognise a high standard of achievement in sports and cultural activities, consistent with the conditions and qualifying standards set for Ashburton College.

PRINCIPAL'S COMMENDATIONS



NEW ZEALAND ECONOMICS COMPETITION

High Distinction in 2019 New Zealand Economics Competition for Ben Holland

This competition has been in existence since 1997, sponsored by The University of Auckland Business School, Treasury, and the Kelliher Economics Foundation. This was set up by the late Sir Henry J Kelliher, in 1965, to advance knowledge of Economics to the wider community.

The 50-minute examination paper tests classroom theory and general knowledge of current economic issues.

From the 2,194 New Zealand students and ten American students who entered the competition, an Awards Presentation Ceremony held at the Business School of the Auckland University on 17 October, recognised the 132 students who achieved High Distinction.

Ben said that it was a real privilege for him and his family to attend the presentation. Their thanks also went to College Economics teacher Ange Mitchell and the College for support.




Performer of The Evening went to Mitchell Farr. Mitchell performed his original item *The Sandwich Artist*.

In 2019 the traditional Family Form time, which ran from 8:45am-9:00am daily, was replaced by Ako time. The Ako hour-long period was factored within the College day, taking place in Period 4 on Wednesdays, for all students.

Ako groups generally held significantly smaller numbers than previous Family Form groups. As for the previous Family Form groups students, where this is possible, will move through their College years with the same staff member.

Programmes in Ako time included the teaching and exchange of knowledge of soft skills required for the future, and engagement in Learning for Life – being Collaborative, Creative, Connected.

The College Values of Quality, Pride and Respect formed a part of Ako time, while programmes such as Reading Mentor, Peer Support and various Year Level and House Assemblies were scheduled within this time.

Ako Interviews were held on 26 February 2019 when College was closed for normal instruction for a day in order to hold Ako interviews, at College, for all year levels through the day and evening. These three-way interviews consisted of fifteen-minute interviews for Year 11, 12, 13 students and twenty five-minute interviews for Year 9 and 10 students.

The purpose of the interviews was for each student to share information, plan, set goals and discuss academic progress and/or career aspirations, with their Ako teacher and parent/caregiver.

In September students from 9Y presented their innovation projects to family and members of the College community. The project required students to follow a brief, and design a space for the College rebuild.



READING MENTOR PROGRAMME

Ashburton College Reading Mentor Programme

At Ashburton College, the Reading Mentors' programme is one of the most important initiatives to help students lift their reading skills and confidence. Every aspect of the programme is based on sound research. In 2019 we once again ran the programme. for approximately fifteen weeks over Terms Two and Three.

Senior students (Reading Mentors) each read to their group of one to three Year 9 students.

The sessions were held in the College Library, to provide a relaxed, informal atmosphere, and food was provided at the start of each session. The Year 12 Reading Mentors were carefully selected: they were keen readers as well as excellent role models. Due to this, we saw them influencing the Year 9 students in areas well beyond reading.

We selected twenty five Year 9 students to be involved in the programme and fifteen Year 12 students who acted as mentors and leaders of the programme. We had outstanding results with excellent progress by over 91% of the Year 9 students. Students, teachers and parents were excited with the positive outcomes, not only in reading but in aspects such as overall confidence increasing and willingness to come to school.

College Library Usage Higher Than Ever Before!

The Ashburton College Library is a busy and vibrant space, supporting student learning and literacy.

At any time of the day there are senior students studying – including Gateway, Online, plus Ara students. Classes are booked in to do research and students come in groups to do book exchanges, use the library computers, get help or advice with learning and research, or collect issue Chromebooks.

During lunchtimes and intervals the Library is full to the brim with students socialising, playing games, reading, doing homework or simply hanging out. In the mornings, before the school day starts, our Reading Mentors' Programme operates with Year 9 and Year 12 students reading together.

Our most recent statistics tell us that, over a week, around 3400 students use our library. This is approximately 700 more than in previous years.

Appreciation

Our Librarians are kept very busy and we are grateful for the help that comes from all of our volunteers: adults, senior students and student volunteers.





VOCAL COACH WORKSHOP

Language and Vocal Coach Workshop for College Choirs

When the Music Department was approached about the possibility of a choral workshop with Catrin Johnsson, renowned Swedish mezzo soprano, they eagerly accepted, knowing that in the approach to The Big Sing, such help and advice would be invaluable to the College choirs. Catrin Johnsson (pictured right) trained at the Royal College of Music in Stockholm and the Royal Academy of Music in London. She is currently Performance Teacher in Voice and Stagecraft at the University of Auckland, and Language and Voice Coach for choirs, Principal of Faculty and Curriculum for the New Zealand Singing School, and adjudicates at various competitions, including for Australasia. She is also an accomplished organist.

Musical Director for the Phoenix Rising choir Angie Cresswell said that, on Thursday 02 May, Catrin spent time with both College choirs individually – Phoenix Rising and Phoenix Chorus, with the students enjoying her vibrant and energetic style of teaching. During the workshop she demonstrated elements of vocal technique, pertaining to individual choir songs, with a good sense of humour which greatly engaged the students. She focused on tone and

to feel and hear the difference.

Catrin commented that she had greatly enjoyed her time with the choirs, and was clearly moved by the bouquet of flowers presented by the Choral Leaders.

THE BIG SING



The Big Sing, the New Zealand Choral Federation's festival for secondary school choirs has been held annually for the past thirty one years. Throughout New Zealand, more than 10,000 singers in 260 choirs from approximately 150 schools enter the regional festivals, which makes this New Zealand's largest choral event. In fact, The Big Sing is the largest schools' choral event anywhere in the world.

This year, the Canterbury *Big Sing* Regional Festival was back in the beautifully restored Christchurch Town Hall, for the first time since the Canterbury earthquakes which meant the event was held with all choirs competing and performing in the same venue on the same day. Eighty singers from Phoenix Chorus (senior choir) and Phoenix Rising (junior choir) were proud to be part of this wonderful celebration of choral music, joining more than 900 singers from twenty seven secondary school choirs from throughout Canterbury, on Friday.

All choirs at The Big Sing must perform three songs - a New Zealand composition or arrangement, a Choral Art song, and a song of the choir's own choice. This certainly makes for a varied and interesting programme and tests the vocal skill of the choirs.

Rising's first song, Tongo, was sung acapella with percussion by Year 10 students Caendal Harris, Maddy Young and Ella Pearson. The remaining songs were accompanied by Stephen Diedricks.

The programme from both choirs was well received by the audience during the competition sessions.

At the end of the Gala Concert, all choirs joined together for the massed item, *Aroha Otautahi*, conducted by Robert Wiremu. This was quite a spectacle with over 900 students on and around the stage, and was a most fitting tribute to a wonderful evening of singing at the Christchurch Town Hall.



Mt Cook Field Trip for Geography Students

The assessment activity requires students to collect data from the scree slopes in the Red Tarns area of Mt Cook, and to describe and explain the variations in sediment between various parts of the scree slope.

Apparently the seals were not all completely co-operative in sharing their beach, but the students got the job done, evaluating beach profiles and sediment sizes at Whalers Bay and a little further on at Armer's Bay.

Measurements from day two were to be used in the students' Research Internal Assessment on return to College. Friday morning saw a few more exercises needing to be undertaken, looking at spit formation. Coastal Processes have now taken on more meaning for students as they have seen the results and landforms they produce.

Year 13 Biology Camp to Portobello, Dunedin

Thirty seven of College's Year 13 Biology students (pictured right), accompanied by Year 13 teachers Carolyn Clough and Kayla Williams, returned from a three-day Biology camp weary but much wiser for the experience.

The camp, based at the New Zealand Marine Studies Centre in Portobello, Dunedin, enables students to work under the guidance of University of Otago Marine Science staff and PhD students to design and carry out individual investigations for an NCEA Level 3 Biology standard. Experiments of this nature are not possible in the normal classroom setting, given constraints of time and the inability to keep a large number of live animals safely

and ethically in the laboratory. The experiments involved investigations with common crab species into the relationships between a changing environment condition that the crabs would experience on the rocky shore, and crab behaviour. Students worked with either Purple Shore Crabs or Half Crabs and investigated such factors as changing salinity, temperature, and water depth on behaviours such as turn-over response, or re-sheltering, or oxygen consumption, or feeding. Data gathered over the three days is then utilised back at College for analysis and discussion, in order to complete experiment reports.

The camp provides an enormous personal challenge for students. They are responsible for their own investigation and for managing the well-being of their crabs, within the prescribed ethical limits. Time management is critical in enabling students to gather sufficient data to analyse, and to schedule their own breaks around testing of their animals. Students worked on their experiments from 9:00am until at least 5:00pm each day, then had additional work to do in the evenings to set up for the following day's experiments.

The camp gives students an excellent insight into what is required to run experiments at university level and beyond. Carolyn Clough said that the behaviour, work ethic, enthusiasm and skill shown by the biologists over the three days was outstanding.

Year 10 Outdoor Education Bush Survival



On Thursday 04 July some of the College's Year 13 Physics students went to the UC Electrical Engineering Department to learn about the role of electrical engineers in society. In each of the labs we were given different tasks.

In the first lab, they were set a task of programming a solar car. The goal was to see who could get the longest distance in two minutes, with the best software for best distance. The team who got the furthest won a prize. In the next lab, they talked to us about how to turn analogue information into digital, and about using the binary system. We were set the task of decoding a short binary code into letters of the alphabet and, again, the group who got the word first won a small prize.

After decoding we were asked to find the most efficient wind turbine with models, using different propellers, at different angles and thicknesses.

During the lunch break students got the opportunity to take part in a car race. The little racing car had been gutted and stripped to just its shell and steering wheel. In it, students got to feel how it was to drive around the race track in virtual reality goggles, while the onlookers could all see what the driver was doing.

After lunch it was off to New Zealand's only high voltage lab, located in Canterbury University, where we saw the electrical principles we had learnt in class applied to real-world problems. There were lots of sparks and bangs, which was all good fun!!

At the end of being in the high voltage lab all students went into Faraday Cage, which protected us when a lethal current was applied to the outside.

Everyone had a lot of fun, and all agreed that it was a great day.







On Wednesday 03 July, Year 12 Physics students went to the University of Canterbury for the day, to visit the new Ernest Rutherford building and to check out the interactive workshops all to do with nuclear physics. During the day students were in two groups, each at different labs doing different activities.

One activity was testing how well carrot slices could block Alpha and Beta radiation; by using a geiger counter which detects and counts ionizing radiation, through small, radioactive disks; to see if any radiation from the sources was detected through the carrot slices.

Elizabeth Ann Eckford was one of the Little Rock Nine, a group of African-American students who, in 1957, were the first black students ever to attend classes at Little Rock Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas. This was after first being refused entry into the school and being barred by guards, even though this followed Federal Judge ordering of integration.



Students Revel in Marine Biology Studies

Year 11 students Gemma Taylor and Dante Vannini, through Ashburton College's Gifted and Talented programme, had the opportunity to take part in a five-day Gifted and Talented Marine Biology Study Week at the New Zealand Marine Studies Centre, Portobello, Dunedin. Held from Monday–Friday of the first week of the 2019 July student holiday break, the students were immersed in-depth in various studies.

Day One was essentially initiation and getting prepared for the following day. Gemma advised that attendees were split into three study topic groups: Benthic (the lowest ocean level – sediment/sand at the bottom of the ocean), Oceanography and Plankton.

Dante and Gemma were both in the Plankton section, of eleven students, but in different groups from each other, thus working on different questions and hypotheses. Gemma's group's hypotheses was centred on bio-diversity and the abundance of plankton compared with the impacts of natural variables, such as salinity and similar. Dante's group was charged with evaluating the abundance and biodiversity of plankton, but dependent on land use.

On Day Two it was off-shore into the Otago Harbour for the first half of the morning, in the University of Otago Research Vessel, with the objective of gaining samples by undertaking different drags with a 200 micron net. Five minutes was spent at each site, with the samples concentrated down so only plankton was remaining. Samples were concentrated through a jar, with a sieve, enabling the students to filter and squeeze out larger samples, and keeping the solid concentrations.

A bonus while out on the water was seeing Royal Albatross', Dusky Dolphins, Little Blue Penguins, and Molly Mawk, the smaller breed of albatross.

The second half of this activity saw students back in the labs, working under microscopes to identify each individual plankton. They said the majority identified were Copepods, Crabs Zoea Lavae, Krill, Phyto Plankton, and Fish Eggs.

From their work they put together graphs showing abundance and the bio-diversity. Day Three was similar to Day Two but with the first half of the day in the laboratory and the second half out in the harbour collecting samples ready for analysis work on Day Four, putting information into graphs and preparing presentations.

Day Five, saw students finalising their presentations which included their seminar project, poster and a song – to be presented to family members and members of the Marine Studies Centre, that afternoon.

Both students were enthusiastic about the week and the opportunity to attend. Dante classed it as 'good fun, where he learnt new stuff and got to meet new people', which Gemma agreed with. She added the fact that it was 'awesome' to have the opportunity to gain extension in Science.

Throughout the programme each group had University Masters' students working with them, and mentoring. Having attended the Year 11 programme the opportunity is there to attend a follow-up course in the following year for Year 12 students. This latter course is not specifically Marine Biology but extends across all Sciences during Otago University's Open Week, with students able to stay in the Halls of Residence.

Gemma Taylor (pictured left, front row, left) and Dante Vannini (pictured below, right – taking it easy on the job) definitely recommend others attend these programmes if they are given the opportunity.

Japan Tour

Twenty Ashburton College students visited Japan from 25 September–11 October accompanied by teacher of Japanese Hiromi Horsley, Principal Ross Preece and family adult members Steph McCallum and Ana Matsis.

Firstly the group visited Ashburton College's Sister School Tokorozawa Kita High School, where staff and students welcomed our College students warmly and held a function after school where the AshColl students met their host brothers/sisters. There is a strong bond between the two schools, resulting from the long-standing reciprocal visits. At this event the AshColl group sang three New Zealand songs.

Friday was school attendance, followed by time spent with their host families at the weekend. A tea ceremony (pictured below) was held for AshColl's students. Hiromi said that kneeling on the floor was very hard for the College students but they were allowed to sit in a way comfortable to them.

From Tokorozawa the group travelled to Kyoto, once the capital of Japan, and visited iconic places including the Nijojo castle and

Kinkakuji temples. Kyoto is famous for its numerous classical Buddhist temples, as well as gardens, imperial palaces, Shinto shrines and traditional wooden houses. On a day trip to Nara, the group visited a Tadaiji Temple (with a Big Buddha), once one of the powerful Seven Great Temples, where they also fed many tame deer.

On the way back to Kyoto the group also visited the Fushimi Inari Shrine (pictured below) with its many torii (traditional Japanese gates) that form tunnels up the hillside.

After visiting a monkey park in Kyoto all students went to Universal Studio Japan on their free day.

En route to Hiroshima, the group visited Himeji Jo, the most beautiful castle in Japan, then another iconic view at Itsukushima Shrine (by ferry). Unfortunately, the gate was covered with a white curtain because of repainting, which was disappointing, but the beautiful scenery was still enjoyed.

The visit to the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum and Peace Park was sad and moving, but the students learned much about the atomic bomb and its victims. That night it was Hiroshima-yaki for dinner, a savoury pancake with a huge amount of cabbage.

Lastly, the group went up to Tokyo and

visited Meiji Shrine, the Sky Tree which is the tallest tower in Japan, and Tokyo Disneyland. Hiromi said the students did very well at crossing the biggest intersection in the world where 3000 people cross at a time!

On their free days the students were able to experience various other aspects of Japan, seeing very traditional as well as very modern parts, and learning much about Japanese culture on this tour.

Principal Ross Preece said that it was a fascinating seventeen days and that Japan is an amazing country, with the warmth and hospitality of the people a significant feature. It is also very crowded! He said that the four-day Homestay experience enabled the students to understand the Japanese lifestyle a little more. The Japanese students typically start school at about 8:30am and lessons continue until 3:30pm, after which clubs start and continue until about 7:00pm. Students then go home for a meal with their family and start their homework, which typically can go to midnight.

Appreciation went to the adults who accompanied the trip and to Hiromi Horsley who organised the whole event and was a tireless organiser. This was no small feat given the crowded rush hour conditions we often faced on the subway.

Our students did a brilliant job of being good ambassadors for both their school and our country.

German Tour 2019

A group of twenty-one Ashburton College students visited Germany from 21 September-13 October.

The tour group landed in Düsseldorf and made their way by bus to their first accommodation in Köln.

Staying in Köln for a total of three days, visits included famous Dom (Cathedral), Innenstadt (Old City part) and the Lindt Chocolate Museum. Tom Kitchen, staff tour leader, said they also visited Phantasialand Resort on one of the days and enjoyed all the rides that the theme park had to offer!

After Köln, it was off to Grevenbroich to stay with host families for five days. Tom said that the students relished learning how most German families live, and enjoyed the different cultural experiences. Homestay is a great way to see how 'authentic' German people live and do their day-to-day business and go about their routines. A lot of students caught up with friends who they had hosted in New Zealand earlier this year, and all attended school with their host sibling for two days. It was a shock for them to be in a classroom without devices, and seeing the teachers still using blackboards! The school in Grevenbroich (Pascal Gymnasium) is slowly moving into being a BYOD school now, which is very modern for Germany.

The group then travelled down to Nürnberg in South Germany, for four days. Viewed there was the traditional old style of a castle city from the medieval times, and a day trip to Lauingen where the tour group's jacket sponsors (Deutz Fahr) have a factory, in Lauingen (*pictured top right*).

The group also went to Dachau and Munich to see a Concentration Camp, and the Oktoberfest. The students gained a real feeling of what life in a Concentration Camp was like when they read the well-detailed signs, and a sombre mood was shared by all when we left there that day.

Next it was up the Eastern side of Germany to Leipzig, for two days. With a market set up on the Saturday, the students could taste many traditional foods there. Of note was the GDR (German Democratic Republic) History Museum which told the story of former East Germany, from the end of the Second World War all the way through to reunification in 1989.

The group finished the tour with five days in Berlin, where they enjoyed





lots of shopping on their free days! As a group they undertook a bike tour together on a day where it poured with rain, but that didn't stop them from learning lots and having a good time. They even got to witness the climate change group 'Extinction Rebellion' during a peaceful protest outside the historic Brandenburg Gate and Reichstag building (pictured above).

One of the last nights was spent in the D light Disco at Club Matric, where only students could go on that evening, as the club closed its doors to the general public.

While in Germany, students experienced and enjoyed very traditional and modern aspects of the culture, and all of the different cities visited.

2019 Classics Tour

Students from Ashburton College and Hillmorton High School took in the sites of ancient Greece and Italy, leaving New Zealand on 20 September and returning 10 October.

The Tour started with a visit to islands neighbouring Athens. Hydra, Poros and Aegina proved popular with the students, with each island holding its own appeal.

Students were then guided around the famed site of the Acropolis with the Parthenon impressing with its magnitude and dominance over the capital city. From there students visited Nauplia, a city steeped in history due to its role as a strategic port that has seen various European Empires rule over it.

The ancient site of Mycenae, home to King Agamemnon of Troy fame, also proved popular. Sparta was another highlight, before students embarked on a journey to Olympia via a climb to the hillside fortress and monastery of Mystra. The tour then went to Olympia, the birthplace of the Olympic Games.

The hillside town of Delphi, regarded as the navel or centre of the ancient world, saw the students informed about the important role the site played in determining politics and history. The hillside monasteries of Meteora were next on the itinerary before students returned to Athens and the Acropolis Museum.

After completing their trip around Greece, the Classics Tour group decamped to Naples, Italy. Naples is well known as a creative city and the home of the pizza, so the visit was greatly anticipated. The tour

group was based in Sorrento near Naples for a couple of nights, from which they visited the archaeological site and ruins of Pompei as well as the impressive Archaeological Museum in Naples.

The site of Pompei impressed the travellers, both in scale as well as features, particularly with a visit to the famed House of Faun. The house was once home to a wealthy and influential Pompeian family and is notable not only for its bronze statue of a faun, now housed in the Archaeological Museum, but also the sheer size of the property. The Archaeological Museum contains many artifacts, frescoes and mosaics from Pompei, including the renowned mosaic of Alexander the Great in battle with Darius III, dating from 100BC.

From Naples, the group went to Rome for a few days, where pavements were pounded as the travellers explored the ancient sites such as the Colosseum, the Roman Forum and Palatine Hill.

Of course, a visit to Rome wouldn't be complete without a visit to the Capitoline Museum. Other attractions included the Trevi Fountain, Trajan's Column and the Pantheon. With The Vatican in Rome, naturally the tour group took in a visit to St Peter's Square and the Vatican Museum, home to the Sistine Chapel as well as other notable exhibits such as the intricate and impressive Laocoon sculpture. From Rome the group departed to Venice, the final stop of the tour.

A Venice highlight included a tour of the Doges Palace, the historical home for the once democratically-elected Duke who previously governed the city state. The trip to Venice put into perspective how influential the Venetians were in global trade and culture throughout

the Mediterranean region, both in classical and renaissance periods.

The tour was led by Greta Hampton and Michael Clark of Ashburton College and Kylie Coulbeck from Hillmorton High School.

Overseas Experiences for Students

At various times a number of College students enjoyed overseas experiences of varying lengths, and here we take a look at what some of these students gained and enjoyed while away.

Leanne Walsh - to Austria

Through the company Your Education, who talked with students at Ashburton College, Leanne came to visit and stay in upper Austria, near the city of Linz. Leaving New Zealand on 08 December 2018 Leanne was into schooling during her summer holiday break which, of course, became a winter experience.

Application for this experience was by way of interview with the Canterbury Area Representative, from Christchurch, plus the customary form-filling including a summary of why Leanne was seeking this experience.

While in Austria she lived in the town of Altenfelden, a small town very similar to Hinds where she hails from. There she lived with host parents and a host sister. She also had a host brother but he was generally away in Vienna. School was in Linz, approximately 40km away by bus.

Leanne said the experience was 'cool – literally and figuratively', and her host family 'really awesome' and supportive. While there she had trips to Vienna, Salzburg and Hallstatt, mostly exploring the area and 'quite often' trying the cuisine. She said that Hallstatt was a very scenic place, and very old.

There were some key differences between life in Austria and that which she had in New Zealand, with food being one major variation. Austria has very few takeaway venues and only four KFC outlets in the whole country. Families eat a lot of home-made food, eat a lot of soup and appear to have an overall healthier diet, although there were plenty of desserts and pastries which were more prevalent than in New Zealand. Schooling was another area of difference, being 'completely different'. Instead of NCEA, students study for Matura, and must compulsorily stay in schooling until they are nineteen years of age. The length of the school day changes daily - for example, at the school Leanne was at students finished around 3:30pm on a Monday, whereas Tuesday and Wednesday was around 1:30pm; Thursday and Friday around 12 noon and just prior to. The day started earlier than here, at 8:00am. Students still moved from subject to subject, had slightly shorter teaching periods than here (50-55 minutes) but had shorter breaks overall, although with five minute breaks between subjects. A school of about 200 students, it was quite a sports-focused school with sports classes held at the end of each day on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Leanne noted students didn't appear to have part-time jobs. She found people very welcoming, friendly and curious about New Zealand

and, at one stage, Leanne gave a presentation about New Zealand to students and their teacher.

Leanne found the language difference a bit challenging to start with and said she started reading Mangas, a Japanese comic book written in German!). German was the key language, with challenges around different dialects. Students were quite good English speakers, making conversation reasonably straightforward.

Leanne's wise advice to other students considering such an opportunity is to 'do it' if they feel they can both raise the necessary money, as this option is a self-funded opportunity, and if the concept appeals to them.

Maigen O'Neill - to Ireland

Maigen, like Leanne Walsh, gained her exchange opportunity also through the Your Education programme. Maigen travelled to Ireland, County Cork, where she was enrolled in Kanturk School.

Maigen left New Zealand on 01 December 2018, returning towards the end of January, so she had her Christmas overseas. She said the opportunity was a good experience from which she learnt a lot, developed her people skills and was able to be involved in a different schooling system. While at school there she took history, learning more about the Irish history, which she found interesting. The English curriculum was different to what she was used to in New Zealand, with a lot of poetry and Shakespeare!

The school day started at a similar time to here, with 45-50 minute periods, but was longer, ending around 4:00pm. As she was in school only for a short time Maigen said there wasn't the same pressure put on as there would be for a longer-stay student. Because of her short tenure she didn't take Irish Gaelic but took English, Biology, Art, Home Economics, Mathematics, and Phys Ed which is a compulsory subject at that school.

Maigen said she enjoyed getting to meet new people, and the sightseeing, visiting Cork, Dublin and Killarney. She loved being there and wants to go back, saying the people were 'really nice' and that she loved her host family.

She would recommend others try for such opportunities but said it can depend where a student goes and to what school. Being there for a

short time can make it more difficult to become part of a group, as you are always going to be leaving soon. But, she said, definitely give it a go and especially if there is a language-learning option.

Overall, Maigen said it was a really great experience and she claims now to have the travel bug!

Amy Pearson and Kate McIlroy - to Germany

Amy Pearson and Kate McIlroy also allocated the bulk of their January summer break for winter time in Frankfurt, Germany. Indeed, it did snow a couple of times they said, which they enjoyed.

At the start of 2018 Kate and Amy applied for a Goethe-Institut scholarship, which included a 50 minute interview with a representative of the Goethe-Institut, at College.

The group involved in this exchange was fifty seven in size, with twelve coming from New Zealand. Kate and Amy were the only ones from outside of a city centre which speaks well for their application, and the College's promotion of programmes and well-acknowledged reputation with the Institut.

While there, all students took part in school lessons, Monday to Friday, being split into four different classes based on their German language ability. At the end of the time the students sat various levels of German language exams, with both Kate and Amy passing their A2 Certificate. Both had gone to Germany with an A1 Certificate under their belts.

The hostel accommodation was described as roomy, shared with three other participants and students allocated with attendees from countries which were not their own.

Outside of school from 9:00am-3:00pm there were numerous activities and places to go to, including baseball and ice hockey, visits to different neighbouring towns – Marburg north of Frankfurt, the city of Mainz on the Rhine River and Giessen also north of Frankfurt. They said there was plenty of sightseeing, lots of shopping and visits to many castles. Experience stand-outs were, for Amy, meeting new people and, for Kate similarly, making new friends from other countries, saying it was 'cool' to meet new people and learn about other cultures.

Both would recommend the experience to other students, saying a benefit was learning a lot more German and seeing the culture. Amy has had one previous trip to Germany on an exchange programme while, for Kate, this was her first visit, but she also travelled there with the College German Tour group during 2019.

Each day we started our drama workshop at 8:45am and continued until 4:30pm, with two breaks in between. The workshop started on the Sunday and went through until we finished on Friday, but there was also the chance to explore and take a tour of some parts of Bali on the Wednesday afternoon. We got to go to a very popular beach right at the south of Bali, to a temple and to see traditional Balinese dance, have a seafood dinner on the beach and, lastly, shopping until 11:30pm. On Friday evening we did our performance, which lasted about twenty minutes, as part of the reception held by the German Embassy. After this, we were invited to the dinner held by the Embassy at the resort. Then it was the flight back to Auckland on 27 October, and another flight back down to Christchurch.

It was an amazing week to go to a country that I have never been to before, and an awesome opportunity to be selected for this scholarship and have a trip to Bali for a week of theatre learning, which is an interest of mine.

Lastly, was the opportunity to meet new friends from different Asian countries and have my German improve greatly over the course of the week.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT

Prime Minister and Minister Education Visit College to Announce **Buildings Upgrade**

Thursday 14 March 2019 became a significant marker day for the future of Ashburton College, when it was announced that College was the recipient of an around \$50m major property redevelopment funding.

This was an exciting outcome, following much background work over approximately the last eight years by the Board of Trustees and College Senior Management, in liaison with the Ministry of Education. Principal Ross Preece has acknowledged the work of staff who have supported the concept of the necessity of a rebuild for Ashburton College.

The investment is targeted at an almost total rebuild of our of Education prediction is a roll of 1,600 students within ten years.

The other factor creating the necessity for a rebuild is that the current S68 building design no longer meets the requirements of an effective classroom in terms of ventilation and natural lighting, and neither is there the ability to change the shape of the buildings or add to

Because of the size of this build it will need to be completed in stages, with completion anticipated close to 2025. Meanwhile the Board of Trustees is clear about maintaining the current campus in a sensibly tidy state for the next five years' generation of students.

With the scope of the redevelopment known, the all-important planning for a futureorientated school has begun with the Ministry of Education. Through the development of a College Education Brief, support of a Ministry of Education Navigator and a Project Manager, an architect firm has been appointed (Baldasso Cortese Noordanus [BCN]) and a Master Plan is being prepared (for completion July 2020). The College and its on-site and external community has input into the final design and priorities.

The addition of Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern to the proposed visit being only by Chris Hipkins, Minister of Education, certainly added to the occasion, and she and Chris Hipkins mixed easily with students and staff, to the enjoyment of all. It was a privilege to have both with us to make the announcement.



Too often we are reading harrowing headlines like these. Too often New Zealanders are becoming statistics on a spreadsheet no one wants to be on. From 23-27 September the Student Welfare Committee organised SADD Week.

This week involved the Head Students and House Captains coming together and promoting messages against dangerous driving. Nearly 400 lives were lost on roads in New Zealand in 2018, making it the country's worst annual road toll in a decade. Twenty five of these drivers were aged between 16–19 years. The SADD Committee members said that everyone deserves to feel safe on our road and this starts with education. Earlier in Term Three Year 12 students at Ashburton College participated in the RYDA

(Rotary Youth Driver Awareness) Road Crash Day at the Hotel Ashburton where they were educated in safe driving.

This SADD Week (Students Against Destructive Decisions), students were encouraged to think about their driving. They were challenged to consider their decision-making on roads, and whether they are keeping themselves safe and making the roads a safe place for those around them.

Annual Chess Match – Third Consecutive Victory to the Staff in 2019





Also attending the exhibition was a Year 9 Japanese class who have been studying



Athlete with a Disability

Delta Taeauga

Delta dominated at the Aoraki Secondary Schools' Athletics Championships winning both the Open Boys' Discus and Shot Put; he competed in the Special Olympics, claiming success in the Mini-Javelin with a throw over eight metres clear of his nearest rival, and was successful in the Men's 100m Sprint. Delta's efforts have been recognised by the Halberg Foundation, from which he is getting help to further his sporting capabilities.

All-Round Sportsperson

Emma Stagg

A dedicated athlete with impeccable time management, Emma allocates the required long hours to be a successful rower, with success as a part of the Under 18 Coxed Quad Sculls team which placed at the South Island Rowing Championships. She is also a successful athlete, gaining two second placings in the Long and Triple Jump at the Aoraki Secondary Schools' Athletic Championships, and is a member of the Ashburton College Senior A Netball team.

All-Round Sportsperson

Taonga Mbambo

A track, road and cross-country runner, Taonga was selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools' and Athletics New Zealand IAAF world cross country teams. At the Australia/Oceania Championships, Taonga was placed 12th in the individual classification and third in the teams' classification. In the Schools' Sport Australia Cross Country Relay his team was placed third. At the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Cross-Country Championships Taonga was placed third, and at the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Championships placed sixth.

Junior Sports Team

Smallbore Rifle Team of Lanelle Millar-McArthur (Captain), Shania Harrison-Lee and Emma Smith.

During the twelve months the Awards period covered, Ashburton College's Smallbore Rifle Team was the number one team in New Zealand, achieved via top placings in the Target Shooting New Zealand Postal Challenge, the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Shooting Postal Match and the Inter-Island Secondary Schools' Shooting Competition.

The team won the South Island Secondary Schools' Title for the third year running, and for team member and Captain Lanelle Millar-McArthur, it was the fourth year running she'd been part of the winning team.

Junior Official

Summer Anderson

Summer was nominated by Basketball Mid Canterbury for her achievements as an official, having officiated at high-level age group basketball matches around the South Island, at a very impressive level. She was awarded the Mid Canterbury Basketball Referee of the Year for Intermediate Grade, was a finalist at the Aoraki Secondary Schools' Referee of the Year, and winner of the AshColl Faith Cup for the important qualities of dedication and sportsmanship in Basketball.

Outstanding Volunteer Award

These awards are a recognition award, not a judged award.

Ashburton College student Madison Trusler-Clark was nominated by Basketball Mid Canterbury and recognised for what she has contributed to the sport of Basketball. Madison is a person who will respond to a call for a task to be done, and is a key behind-the-scenes figure of Mid Canterbury Basketball. Madison coaches various age groups and levels of players, runs the sideline as a referee or sitting on the bench handling the substitutions. Madison is acknowledged for the huge amount of personal time she has given for the betterment of the sport at local level. This is an impressive accolade for a Year 10 student.

• Paul Ackerley

New Zealand Hockey Team member over a long period, he was chosen for two Olympic teams but New Zealand didn't compete at the boycotted games in Moscow in 1980. Paul was a member, however, of the New Zealand Hockey Team which won Gold at the 1976 Montreal Olympics, beating Australia 1-0.

Paul retained a strong interest in hockey, coaching the New Zealand Women's team for six years during which time the team won Commonwealth Games Bronze Medal at Kuala Lumpur in 1998. He later coached the Wellington Women's team.

Sadly illness saw Paul die in 2011, at the age of 61.

• Hayden Roulston

Hayden, MNZM, is a former New Zealand professional racing cyclist. He won the Silver Medal in the Men's 4000m Individual Pursuit and a Bronze Medal in the Men's 4000m Team Pursuit at the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing.

Hayden was a talented junior rider on both road and track and competed for New Zealand on the track and initially on the road for a club team in France. He turned professional with the French team Cofidis in 2002 where he remained for two seasons before moving to Discovery Channel for 2005. His season with Discovery Channel featured some impressive rides but was interrupted by injury.

With numerous successes and national titles to his name Hayden has turned to coaching, through Roulston Coaching, supporting successful national results and personal bests achieved for many Roulston Coaching riders. Hayden has also been working on establishing a Roulston Foundation, with the goal of removing financial burdens that athletes and families face, and to create clear pathways to the top of the sport.

XTERRA 2018

XTERRA World Championships 2018

Deputy Head Boy Matthew Clough competed in the XTERRA World Championships in Maui, Hawaii, early November 2018. Matt gained selection into the New Zealand team for this event after his second placing in the New Zealand XTERRA Championships held in Rotorua earlier in 2018.



XTERRA is a series of cross-triathlon races, three-sport races which include swimming, mountain biking and trail running. It is an off-road triathlon and, in Maui, this consisted of a 1.5km ocean swim that started from the shore at D.T. Fleming Beach in Kapalua; a 32km mountain bike ride that climbs up over 1000m on the West Maui mountains; followed by a 10.5km trail run that traverses forest trails and sandy beaches.

To say that the conditions were challenging was an understatement! For several weeks prior to race day, Maui had experienced significant rainfall and, as such, the bike and run trails were extremely muddy making conditions very tough and, at times, dangerous for competitors. On race day, the bike course was modified to eliminate the bottom part of the course as the trails were virtually impassable.

Coupled with the challenge of copious thick, clay-like mud, competitors were also faced with the heaviest seas (pictured right) in the competition's twenty three year history. Several people were plucked out of the ocean with injuries as they were pummelled by huge waves and lost their footing in the strong undertow.

Matt, being a strong swimmer, coped well in the surf and left the swim leg in 4th place.

However, the bike leg was incredibly tough as

he often struggled to get enough clearance to pedal or to clear the mud which was caked between his wheels and his bike frame. He was described as almost unrecognisable as he entered transition for the final time, in 9th place. He ran as strongly as possible in the greasy mud for the 10.5km and managed to keep both of his shoes, unlike many competitors who finished

Overall, Matt finished in 9th place in the Under 19 age group in a time of 4 hours and 14 minutes.

without shoes, or had to stop and dig through

the mud to recover them!

His total time was over an hour slower than he had anticipated which shows how tough the conditions were on the day, but he was delighted to take a top 10 world placing.


Friday brought a win, in what was a re-match against Waimea College. This match was to finalise positions 9-11 at the tournament. Jason said that College was determined not to lose

Coach Vaughan Matheson said that the boys started the tournament off on the first day with two very close losses to the High Schools of South Otago (24–17) and Lincoln (42–34). Vaughan said the team improved a lot in the second game on attack, but defensively leaked too many points.

The second day started with a much improved performance versus a very strong Darfield High School team, eventually losing 28–22. However,

injuries and fatigue led to a comprehensive loss against Waimea College (42–5).

On the final day the team gained a 14-all draw against Roncalli College before finally earning a much-deserved win against Rangiora High School (19–14) to finish in 13th place.

Although frustrated with the three close losses the coaches were happy with the players' efforts and, with the team being a young one, all are looking forward to next year's tournament and benefitting from the experience gained this year.

Senior Boys' Basketball – 15th Placing

The Boys' College A Basketball team competed in the Schick AA Secondary School Zone 4 Nationals, also held in Nelson within a field of twenty two teams. The team's three wins and five losses reaped a final placing of 15th.

Coach Brian Kerr outlined their games – Game 1: v Shirley Boys' High School (81–44 loss) - The boys were up for this challenge and played well in general but struggled to find the net even though they gave themselves plenty of opportunities. Fotu Hala scored 16 points, but his time on court was limited due to early foul trouble

Game 2: v Marlborough Boys' High School (100–74 win) - Players employed a 1-2-1-1 press which proved very effective in creating turnovers and allowing College to have a successful running game. Sam Pearce had a great game top-scoring with 24 points, with Riley Sa adding a further 21.

Game 3: v Waimea College (102–88 loss) - This was a terrific game where the team threw everything at a strong Waimea team, with College leading half-way through the third quarter. At this stage Waimea looked like they

might pull away comfortably, as they got up to 14 points ahead. However, College didn't go away and with a couple of minutes to go had dragged the score back to within 6 points which panicked Waimea into calling a time out. Again, fouls were problematic and Waimea took out a high quality encounter, which saw big games by Fotu Hala, Sam Pearce and Mitch Ruffell. Game 4: v James Hargest, (57–44 win) - In a game described as one College should have dominated, some tired bodies, and an inspired defensive effort by James Hargest, made it a lot tighter than necessary, with College battling through for an uninspiring win.

Game 5: v St Bede's College, for a close 84–81 loss - St Bede's had dealt College a 28 point hiding in the Thomson Trophy earlier in the year, but the boys went out on a mission. Again, utilising the press, they put St Bede's under a lot of pressure, with the game going down to the wire and with a 50/50 call proving costly. Fotu Hala was massive with 30 points (4 – 3 pointers), Sam Pearce was everywhere with 18 points and Mitch Ruffell shot some big shots hitting 15 points, all of which were 3 pointers.

Game 6: v Christchurch Boys' High School, and another close loss (79–76) - For the second time on the same day, College missed out by 3 points, in what was another tough encounter in which the boys were again excellent. This was another terrific game which went down to the wire. Fotu Hala scored 22 points, Sam Pearce 19 points and Pasi Hala 12 points.

Game 7: v St Thomas of Canterbury College (88–65 loss). A tired-looking team took the court but they played really well up until half-

way through the third quarter and then literally ran out of steam, to allow St Thomas to run out as comfortable winners.

Game 8: v Timaru Boys' High School (88–73 win) - After an early 10 point lead to AshColl in the first quarter, Timaru pulled their way back to even through some highly accurate 3 point shooting. The score remained tight until the start of the fourth quarter, with College holding a 4 point lead at the half-time break. AshColl then dominated the fourth quarter, pushing to the win. Sam Pearce top-scored with 27 points, including four 3 pointers; Kalen Tait 17 points, with two 3 pointers; and Fotu Hala and Riley Sa, both 13 points.

At this tournament the team missed out on the services of **Quinn Ritchie**, due to a knee injury sustained three weeks earlier. There was a hope that he would play later in the tournament. However, after having some time on the court, Quinn decided not to risk further injury, which was a very mature decision from a young head who desperately wanted to play.

Will Joyce was another player who had really improved over the season and had shown what he was capable of. Unfortunately he picked up a niggle at the team's last training run and, after a couple of games, the injury flared up and ruled him out of the rest of the tournament.

Coach Brian Kerrr said they had a really good team unit, with that bond increasing at tournament time. The boys should be proud of how they played and, with a bit more good fortune, the 15th place finish could have been higher. Importantly, they played hard for each other.

Appreciation

The team loses three from this squad after this year. Fotu Hala, Quinn Ritchie and Sam Pearce will be missed, and have been appreciated for what they have contributed to the team.

On the plus side, the team is fortunate to have a good core of players with tournament experience to take into next years' squad.

This left Toby Woolf with a big advantage going into the run but Toby did not rest on his laurels and increased the team's lead even further.

Brynmor Workman's rugby training paid off, as he finished only seven seconds behind Josh. Reece Watson and Quinn Ritchie also finished under the Excellence time of 45min 02 seconds for 4th and 5th placings.

Female Section

Emily Armstrong, Aidan Elvines, Dani McArthur and Emma Stagg had all shown most promise in the training trials. However, on race day, with

Four of AshColl runners finished with top 10 placings: Toby Woolf - 2nd Senior Boys' 6km (21.43); Ted Yee - 3rd Senior Boys' 6km (21.48); Ella Pearson - 3rd Intermediate Girls' 3km (13.06); Jessie Pitney - 8th Junior Girls' 3km (14.03).

Second Placed in Senior Boys' Teams' Event:

The Senior Boys' team of Toby Woolf, Ted Yee and Flynn Mackenzie were second-placed, just two points back from Timaru Boys' High School.

New Zealand Secondary Schools' Track, Field and Road Championships 2018 and 2019

This prestigious year-culminating event was held at Newtown Park in Wellington from 06-08 December, with Lusungu Mbambo College's only representative this year. Lusungu competed in the 100m, long jump and triple jump, qualifying

through to the quarter-finals in the 100 metres event. During the weekend she did sustain an injury also, receiving help from Timaru's Craighead Diocesan School physiotherapist.

In 2018 Ashburton College had just the two students taking part in the Perpetual Guardian New Zealand Secondary Schools' Track and Field and Road Championships, held in Dunedin from 30 November-02 December.

Taonga Mbambo went into the races coming off an injury which meant only ten days of training after his recovery from the injury, and prior to the event. However, he was pleased with his performances given the circumstances and appreciated his last opportunity to represent Ashburton College. Taonga and his family noted that it had been a privilege for Taonga to represent Ashburton College, thanking College for the opportunity. It would be fair to say that this has been a mutual privilege.

In the 3000m Senior Boys' Prelims Taonga ran a 9:31.42 which, on this occasion, wasn't fast enough to qualify him for the finals. After this race a hamstring injury required physio assistance which saw him through the 6000m Road Race.

In the 6000m Road Race Taonga finished a very creditable 7th, in a time of 19:48, from a field of seventy four athletes.

Year 11 student Ted Yee was our other athlete and Ted had the opportunity to experience competition against New Zealand's best secondary school track runners. Ted competed in the 1500m and 3000m events. Due to high entry numbers preliminary heats were held on Friday and Saturday, with the top sixteen fastest finishers qualifying for the finals on the third and last day of competition.



In the 3000m Ted finished 11th from fourteen runners, in a time of 9:54, but not fast enough to qualify for the finals. However, Ted achieved his personal goal of an under ten minute finishing time. Forty six runners representing a total of thirty five teams contested this distance.

In the 1500m event Ted again achieved his own personal goal of finishing under the five minute mark, with a finish time of 4:41, to finish in 16th place. In this event forty eight runners contested the event.

College Athletes at New Zealand Secondary Schools' Cross-Country

Following strong performances on the same course in the Aoraki Cross-Country Championships, three AshColl students went back to Ashbury Park in Timaru to take on the nation's best runners in the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Cross-Country Championships, on 15-16 June 2019.

Jessie Pitney competed in her first nationals, in the Year 9 Girls' race, with Toby Woolf and Ted Yee competing in the Senior Boys' race. Junior runner, Ella Pearson, was unavailable due to other sporting commitments.

Racing took place over two days with the individual races on Saturday and regional team relays on Sunday. Modifications to the course from the Aoraki Championships a few weeks previously were the addition of gates and benches to hurdle, which added an extra challenge for the runners.

Runners were selected for the regional relays based on their finishes in their regional championships and the national championships.

Jessie, Toby and Ted were all selected for the Aoraki regional teams, which was recognition of their results on the Saturday.

Jessie was first runner underway on Saturday and she ran a controlled, steady race throughout



the 3km. Whilst a challenge to run in such a large field of runners, Jessie maintained a solid pace to finish in 59th place in a time of 13:39.

Senior boys, Ted and Toby, faced a really tough task in the largest field of the day, with 195 runners all jostling for position on the start line of the 6km race. The pace was explosive from the gun. Ted found some space and finished strongly in 55th place, in a time of 22:06. However, Toby struggled to find his rhythm and was constantly caught in the middle of packs of runners. He was disappointed to finish well back in the field in a time of 24:08.

Relay Course



Blake swam his way into finals in every event he entered and so placed in the top 10 in his age group in New Zealand. He also achieved a 100% personal best rate which is what all swimmers aim for at nationals.

Bronze Medal for Swimmer Blake Farr

Blake Farr was in sparkling form at the New Zealand Short-Course Swimming Championships, held from 02-06 October 2018, at the Sir Owen Glenn National Aquatic Centre, Auckland. He was among almost 700 swimmers competing from throughout New Zealand and overseas.

Blake was competing in three events at the championships, swimming first in the 50m Freestyle gaining 5th placing in a great new personal best time of 25.65s. In the 400m freestyle, Blake was just outside his personal best to finish 14th in 4:23.47.

However, in his final swim, Blake gained his first national medal finishing 3rd in the 100m Freestyle in a new personal best time of 55.48.

New National Swimming Champion and Record Holder

The New Zealand Short Course Swimming Championships were held in Auckland from 01-05 October 2019 and AshColl's two swimmers at the meet - Blake Farr and Hannah King - had great personal achievements.

Blake returned with a National Title in the 100m Freestyle and a Bronze Medal in the 200m Freestyle. He also achieved personal best times in every race which is an impressive achievement. Blake's results in the Boys' 15 years age group were: 1st - 100m Freestyle; 3rd - 200m Freestyle; 4th - 800m Freestyle; 6th - 400m Freestyle; 8th - 50m and 1500m Freestyle.

Hannah King also had a great meet at her first appearance at the National Short Course Championships, swimming personal best times in all but one race. She also achieved a new Canterbury Record in the Girls' 13 Years 1500m Freestyle, smashing the previous record by an impressive 19 seconds.

Hannah's top 10 results in the Girls' 13 Year Old Age Group were: 4th - 200m Breaststroke and 400m Individual Medley; 5th - 800m Freestyle; 6th - 1500m Freestyle; 7th - 100m Breaststroke and 400m Freestyle.

New Zealand Secondary Schools Swimming Championships, 2018

Results from the four days were -

The first game against Whanganui High School saw the team have a sluggish start and trailing 3–9 by the end of the first quarter. However, the girls picked themselves up and fought back, only losing the 2nd and 3rd quarters by two and winning the last one by one goal, but they couldn't make up the first quarter deficit, losing 26–35.

Next up was Saint Kentigern College, winners of the Upper North Island Secondary Schools' tournament and probable favourites to take out the national title. Ashburton College came out of the blocks firing and at the end of the first quarter it was all tied up at 10–10. This was

Day 2 began against Epsom Girls' Grammar School who made it very difficult for College to get the ball into their shooters, due to the height of defenders. The final score was 19-44 but it didn't reflect the effort that the girls put in on the court and, in fact, College drew the last quarter 6-6.

Against Villa Maria College the girls took the positives from the Epsom game into their match that afternoon. At half-time the game was all locked up at 17-all, but a drop in intensity by College in the third quarter saw them trailing by 7 going into the last quarter. A strong fight-back saw them get within three of Villa, losing 32-35. This was the closest the team had come to Villa all season, as College lost to them at South Island's by 9, so they were thrilled to get a point from the game for finishing within three goals. Day 3 started against St Mary's College, the team that finished 4th at the Lower North Island Secondary Schools' Tournament. Both teams came out fighting and that set the tone for the whole game. Down at half-time by 9-10 College applied lots of defensive pressure, creating multiple turnovers to see them take the lead 21-19 by half-time. However, St Mary's came back at College and turned the score around to see them leading 29-27 at the end of the third quarter. A couple of crucial turnovers in the final quarter saw the game just slip away, eventually going down 36-40.

The game against Napier Girls' High School saw a short turnaround time between games, with Napier shooting out of the blocks having College down by 13–30 at half-time. This became a true game of two halves, with Ashburton College clawing their way back into the game and just losing the third quarter 10–11 to be down 23–41. All the players got on the court and College won the last quarter 10–7, with the final score being 33–44.

Day 4 has teams playing-off for final placings. For College this was against Samuel Marsden Collegiate School. This was the first time this school had ever qualified for Nationals. Playing for 15th or 16th place meant both teams wanted to finish on a win. This was a tight game,

Ruby was placed New Zealand Child Equestrian Champion in the Show Hunter 12 years' and under category, jumping at 80cm.

She was also winner of the 90cm Show Jumping speed round; placed 3rd in the Champion Hand Hunter Class, and 4th in the Category C National Title Class.

At the Canterbury Championships Ruby and *Chico* also gained strong placings, with a 3rd placing in the 90cm Show Jumping, and 4th placing in the 90cm and 1m Show Jumping round.

South Island Team Show Jumping Championships

This duo represented the Rakaia Pony Club at the South Island Team Show Jumping Championships in Mosgiel, gaining an individual 4th placing in one of the rounds.

Earlier Successes

Preceding these successes Ruby had a number of positive outcomes at events on her Dressage Pony, *Camesso Royal Flush (Roy)*. At the Ashburton Dressage Championships in December 2018 and at the Canterbury Dressage Championships she won the Champion Level 2 Pony Class, and at the Canterbury Championships was overall Pony Champion.

In January 2019 she represented the Ashburton, South Canterbury, North Otago area at the New Zealand Pony Club Dressage Championships in Blenheim where the team placed second in the South Island.

At the South Island Dressage Championships Ruby and *Roy* gained **Reserve Champion at Level 2** and were selected for

the New Zealand Equestrian Sport South Island Talent ID Dressage Squad.



New Zealand National Show Jumping and Show-Hunter Championships

Year 13 student Harriet Stock also competed at the 2019 Tavendale and Partners' New Zealand National Show Jumping and Show-Hunter Championships, gaining a **4th placing**. The event was held at McLean's Island, Christchurch. Riding *Eb Esperanza*, Harriet competed in this two-round competition held over two days, in the 1.25m-1.35m class.

At the end of the first day's speed class Harriet and *Eb Esperanza* were leading the class. However, on day two of two rounds within the one class, they dropped two rails which took them to 4th place.

At national level, though, this is an impressive outcome and, further, it was their first time at that height. Harriet said she was very pleased with the results and that her horse went amazingly.

To compete at this level a rider has to be already riding at Grand Prix level, which means these classes were made up of elite level riders and horses, comprised of a top eight group of starters from which one pairing didn't finish. Harriet has now competed in four shows as a Grand Prix rider, jumping to 1.30m.

Winning Combination at Takapoto Estate Show Jumping

From 26 March-03 April Harriet, her two ponies and family support crew, were at Cambridge for the above event. This show is the first privately owned show and event centre to operate in New Zealand. Harriet said it was 'so cool', and is the first international surface to be laid down in





New Zealand, taking the sport to another level. The owners hold this one show, over two weeks each year.

Top riders, and ponies and horses, from throughout New Zealand take part although, Harriet said there were only a few ponies from the South Island.

The programme saw the warm-up round on day one, the speed competition on the second day – being one round against the clock – while Day Three saw the final day for the Pony Class. Day one was in the sand arena, while the remaining two days were on the grass arena, with a different course of around twelve jumps each day. Jumps were at 1.25m and qualify as a Grand Prix level, with all classes limited to a maximum of thirty riders.

Pony Class Title Winner

Harriet and pony *Eb Esperanza* rode their way clear throughout the early rounds, joining the other pairings in the final, all of whom had jumped clear and posted good times in the speed round.

After the first round in the final, the six combinations which jumped clear then came back for another round, which was also against the clock. Three of these riders jumped clear, to score a double clear, one of whom was Harriet. With her time half a second quicker than the

next competitor the title was Harriet's, at 41.03 seconds, in what she describes as the 'best day of her life'. It was a very exciting outcome, for a very hard-working but humble competitor.

Land Rover Horse of the Year Competition

From the Takapoto competition Harriet headed to Hastings to compete in the prestigious Horse of the Year Competition and to realise her long-time dream of competing at this top New Zealand event.

Again competing in the Pony Class, events were held daily between 12–17 March, starting with the warm-up/qualifying round. Riders and horses qualify via specific events and, through virtue of her Takapoto win, Harriet and *Eb Esperanza* were within the top twenty combinations which had qualified.

With the warm-up/qualifying round, all riders have to undertake it, although the top twenty competitors still have safe entry into the competition. Approximately seventy combinations contested the last ten spaces.

Harriet was disappointed that, in the Pony of the Year Class, she didn't get into the second round on this occasion, saying it was 'gutting', but acknowledges this was her first Horse of the Year Competition, and that qualifying and attending was an amazing experience.

Canterbury Schools' Show Jumping

Held on Wednesday 20 February at the National Equestrian Centre, McLean's Island, Christchurch, the four member teams competed well. Teaching staff member Karen McKenzie was the Manager.

Twenty-five teams from schools throughout Canterbury competed for the Mitavite Trophy. Teams consisted of four riders who must complete two rounds of Show Jumping with the aim of not incurring any faults, and riders with zero faults are awarded points. Further points are awarded for individual placings from 1st–10th places. There are three levels of show jumping: 85cm, 95cm, 105cm, and each team had to have a rider represented at each jump height, while the fourth rider can compete at any jump height.

In the first round Ashburton College started very well when Brittany Fowler and *Apsley Backchat Kid* were placed 1st in the 95cm round. Sarah Mattson on Windward Legacy was 8th in the 85cm round, and Ruby Thomas on *Chico*, although unplaced, completed her round with zero faults. Team leader Harriet Stock on *Night Beetle*, on this occasion, had the unfortunate experience of starting before the bell, which put her out of the competition in the first round.

The second round of jumping was, however, less successful for Ashburton College with only Ruby Thomas and *Chico* completing a clear round, for zero points and 7th place overall. That left the team in 5th placing at the end of this round. However the final placing of 8th overall, was a creditable outcome from twenty-five teams.

Show Hunter Competition

In addition to show jumping, a Show Hunter competition was held at the same time, with good results for Ruby and Sarah. Ruby Thomas and *Chico*, completing a lovely round, and judged on style, placed 1st while Sarah Mattson and *Windward Legacy* placed 6th.

5th Placing for College at Canterbury Inter–Schools' Dressage Competition

Held at the McLean's Island National Equestrian Centre on Wednesday 27 March, Manager Karen McKenzie said that twenty seven teams from Timaru to North Canterbury contested this prestigious dressage trophy.

Each school provided four riders, with two riders competing at Level 1, and two at Level 2. Each rider rode two different dressage tests and penalties were deducted for any mistakes. The scores were converted to a percentage and both of the riders' scores were added together. All four riders' combined scores contributed to the team total.

Individual Results were:

Brittany Fowler - 1st Level 2C (by 3.7% which is a high percentage winning score), 5th 2B class. Combining both scores gave her Top Placing Overall in Level 2.

Ruby Thomas - 5th Level 2B class

Harriet Stock - 1st Best Presented Turnout Prize.



Positive Showing at Canterbury Schools' One Day Equestrian Event

This event was also held at the National Equestrian Centre, McLean's Island, Christchurch, but on Sunday 11 August. Twenty five teams from throughout Canterbury participated in this event which incorporated Dressage, Cross-Country and Show Jumping.

Ashburton College's Best Score of the Day and 2nd Overall Placing in the 80cm section went to Year 10 student Sarah Mattson riding Windward Legacy, including Dressage,

Show Jumping and Cross-Country.

Team competition points were extremely close, especially between 2nd and 4th place-getters, resulting in 1st placing for Rangiora High School (103.6); 2nd for Christchurch Girls' High School (105.2); 3rd Lincoln High School (105.5) and 4th for Ashburton College (105.7).

Brittany was also Captain of the Canterbury Dressage Team which she competed with, and which finished in top placing in both the South Island competition and nationally.

The New Zealand Dressage Championships competition took place in Blenheim towards the end of January 2019. However, this national competition was run firstly in the South Island and then the North Island, with the same judges managing both events. It was therefore a matter of waiting three weeks to see what scores were gained by riders in the North Island competition.

Under 25 Dressage Championships, Taupo

Held from Wednesday 12 April to Sunday 16 April, Brittany and her pony *Apsley Backchat Kid* competed in the Level 3 Horse section, as the only pony in the class which, Brittany said, was quite challenging. Having turned seventeen, Brittany was required to ride in the Horse Section.

The best result for the pair was 5th placing in the musical freestyle, which was a good achievement for their first time at this style of dressage. Brittany said she was pleased with her percentage outcome, compared against

This result still placed them, however, a very creditable second place overall. They were competing in the DC Section, jumping 1.05m. The Canterbury team placed 3rd overall.

Tinten Grammar Horse Trials, Melbourne, Australia with New Zealand Inter-School Eventing Team

Following Auckland, Brittany flew out to Australia with the team, on Wednesday 26 April. Competing in Australia, for guarantine and convenience/cost reasons, has the challenge of riding loan horses.

The riders were matched up with their horses before a dressage lesson with a top Australian Coach while, in the afternoon, there was a Show Jumping course, followed by a Cross-Country school on Friday, with other international competitors.

The inter-schools' competition was held between Australia, Hong Kong and New Zealand, but also with seventeen schools involved from Australia. Each team was comprised of four members.

Top Results for Brittany

Brittany placed second in the Dressage on the Saturday while, on the Sunday she and her horse went double clear, to be overall winner, and winner of the overall International Challenge. The class was 95cm level.

Brittany was the only South Islander to be selected and, with only four students in the team, selection was very prestigious.



achieving a 1-0 win over Australia and then a 5-3 win to claim the Bronze Medal.



At the end of this round College was trailing by three points.

Target Shooters' Fifth Consecutive 'Triple S' Team Win

Ashburton College's Target Shooters have continued to perform at a significantly high level, with Ashburton College winning the New Zealand 'Triple S' Teams' Event ('Triple S' being the title for the Secondary Schools' Shooting Championships) for the fifth consecutive year, which is an outstanding outcome, highlighting real dedication and skill.

The Winning College Team consisted of Shania Harrison–Lee, Jacob Kilworth, Charlotte McKenzie and Emma Smith.

Notable Results

Especially notable in the results was **Emma Smith** who placed 1st in A Grade on a total of 493.24; and Year 9 student **Charlotte McKenzie** who placed first in D Grade on a total of 477.19. **Jacob Kilworth** was also well-placed, in D Grade, scoring 466.13 points to place 5th from the ninety shooters in D Grade. This is the first year competing for both Charlotte and Jacob.

The shooters in this competition compete over four rounds. College Top-Scorers in this round were – Shania Harrison-Lee (199.16) and Emma Smith (198.10). Shania was the only competitor in the Masters Class but, as can be seen below, her levels of success remained extraordinarily high.

Defending Champion Success for Shania Harrison-Lee

NZTS announced that defending champion, Shania Harrison–Lee, retained her Triple S Crown. After losing the lead in Round 2, Shania only dropped one more point in the last two rounds to clinch the Triple S Title, with her combined score of 494.33.

This was a closely fought battle with College

team mate **Emma Smith coming in second,** only one point behind, on 493.24.

The second Ashburton College team also placed respectably, with Sam Smith placing 10th in C Grade, from thirty three shooters, on 473.09.

Finishing in the Top Quarter of D Grade, from the field of 90 competitors, were – Jack McIntosh 6th placed, on 463.13; Brontson Cudmore 18th placed, on 454.10; Sarah du Toit 20th placed, on 453.10; and Jack Jones 24th placed, on 452.05.

Shania Harrison-Lee: Oceania Target Shooting Gold and Bronze Medals in Open Competition

The Oceania Shooting Federation Championships were held from 01-09 November, in Australia, with Shania selected as part of the Target Shooting New Zealand contingent contesting the Men's and Women's 50m Rifle Prone.

At the Championships all shooting sports registered with the International Federation were competed for. The 3P Rifle Prone event is competed for over the three positions of standing, kneeling and prone. One of the big challenges of this event in Australia was the fact that it was outdoors, and therefore open to weather/wind influences, plus being at the 50 metre distance rather than the 25 yard distance which the New Zealanders are used to shooting over, indoors.

However, given this championship didn't cover junior shooter sections, Shania was escalated into the Senior Women's team which makes her achievements all the more significant given the years of experience she was shooting against.

Team Result - Gold Medal

Shania was a member of the New Zealand Women's B Team which defied their ranking by working through the opposition and gaining wins over New Zealand C, Australia B, Australia

A and the New Zealand A Team to take out the title.

Shania was the team's top scorer overall, totalling 614.3, followed by team-mates Rachel McLaren and Kirsten Birrell both on 610.2.

Individual Result – Bronze Medal

In the Individual event, from Shania's overall total of 614.3, she gained a Bronze Medal placing behind Sally Johnston of New Zealand (616.3) and Susannah Smith of Australia (614.5). It is worthy of note that Sally Johnston was a Glasgow Commonwealth Games Gold Medalist so Shania was certainly showing out in illustrious company. In gaining her total score Shania stayed above 100 for each string.

Junior Oceania Record

In taking out the Bronze Medal, Shania's score was sufficient to also print her name on a new

Oceania Record, well ahead of the former record of 609.2 set in 2017 by Jaqueline Hatzigiannis at the Oceania Games held on the Gold Coast, Australia.

Smallbore Rifle Shooting Nationals Reap Top Female Shooter and Team Overall Second Placing

The Ashburton College Shooting team of Shania Harrison–Lee, Emma Smith and Charlotte McKenzie, with Coach Bryan Hunter and Manager Nina McKenzie, took part in the Target Shooting New Zealand Inter–Secondary Schools' event from 27–30 September 2019, in Wellington.

Twenty-one schools competed from throughout

New Zealand, with **Ashburton College placing second**, missing out on the title position by only 2.04 points.

Top Female Trophy to Shania Harrison-Lee

This was Shania's fourth year in this tournament and, in her words, she 'grabbed the top shot award' to bring home the Top Female Shooter trophy.

Shania Harrison-Lee Captaincy: During 2019, Shania captained the South Island and New Zealand Secondary School teams, for the South versus North Island competition, and the New Zealand team competing against Great Britain in a postal shoot. The results of this event are not known until February/March of the following year due to Great Britain's winter shooting season just beginning at the time of the shoot.

Emma Smith – Teams' Qualification: This was Year 12 student Emma Smith's third year at this event. Emma also qualified for a place in the South Island team placing fourth, and in the New Zealand team.

Charlotte McKenzie – Team Qualification and Strong Results

Charlotte had an amazing weekend in this, her first year competing in Rifle Shooting and her first year at the Secondary Schools' event, particularly given she is a Year 9 student. Charlotte qualified in ninth place in the South Island team, which was made up of twelve shooters.

Shania Harrison-Lee: Top National Target Shooting Results

Over the days 18–23 February Shania was immersed in the Target Shooting New Zealand Outdoor Nationals, held at McLean's Island, Christchurch. Having started outdoor shooting only in November 2018 Shania's hard work and application paid off with outstanding results.

Shooting outdoors carries weather variables not having to be considered for indoor shooting, which Shania is more accustomed to. She said that there was significant wind over the days, plenty of dust, and difficult, unpredictable conditions but that that all made for a good challenge.

On this occasion Shania was the only College and Target Shooting Mid Canterbury representative. With the early part of the competition being qualification rounds for the final two days, this means, for some shooters, that they don't get to shoot on the last two days.

The match was a 60-shot string, made up of 6 x 10 shot strings, and with both medals gained within the same match. Electronic scoring makes for a precise outcome with final bullseyes graded from 10.0 to the perfect score of 10.9, meaning a match is out of a possible score of 654.

Competing at Senior Women's Level

Within New Zealand Shania is still eligible

Shania's Impressive Array of Results were:

Individual Results: Silver medal – Junior Women's; 1st placed in the 50m 2x 60 C Grade; C Grade Badge Match – Gold Medal; 1st placed in the New Zealand Smallbore Rifle Shooting Association C Grade Championship Aggregate (cumulative scores across the whole event); Isle of Man Trophy – Top Junior Aggregate; New Zealand Smallbore Rifle Shooting Association – C Grade Grand Aggregate (total of the two graded matches plus the designated match which for Shania was the Women's Nationals).

Appointments and Results with Teams' Events, Shooting for Christchurch –

Captain Junior New Zealand Team; Junior New Zealand Women's Drew; New Zealand Women's Team; New Zealand Wakefield Competition (Top Ten shooters); New Zealand Slazenger Competition (Top Twenty shooters); South Island Team; Christchurch Association Team – the team placed 4th and Shania top-scored overall.

Shania placed third in the Inter-Island Competition, with the top three competitors within 0.5 points of each other.

Over the time away Shania used approximately 700 rounds of ammunition, and was 'in the sling' for almost thirteen hours over the five days.

New Zealand Blazer Pockets

Blazer pockets are the most prestigious awards presented to shooters based on the high level of their results.

Shania is now the proud wearer of three pockets – the Junior and Women's pockets gained from indoor shooting last year while, following these Nationals, she has now been presented with the **New Zealand Open Pocket** which is a stunning achievement, as a Year 12 student shooting in the Open Classes.

Pockets are forever! Once earned they are with the shooter for life.

Continuing Successes for Ashburton College Rifle-Shooting Team, 2018

Through 2018 the College's shooting team shot and sent away four rounds of targets, competing against other schools and individuals from all around New Zealand, in what is known as a postal shoot. The four rounds were completed consecutively by 10 June, 08 July, 05 August and 02 September.

Lanelle Millar-McArthur: Third placed in the Triple S competition, on a total of 489.29 points. Winner Masters Grade.

Emma Smith: Placed third in the B Grade Championship, with a total score of 481.57.

In the D Grade Competition – Ben Thomas placed 9th, and Sam Smith 12th.

2018 has been a hugely successful year for the three girls as a team together, and Shania and Emma said they would miss having Lanelle around in 2019 as she headed off to university, but that will hopefully pave the way for new juniors to come through.


Overall Winners at Aoraki Secondary Schools' Golf Tournament

However, overnight rain meant the Downhill track was muddy for the practise runs and heavy rain just before the race created very challenging conditions to ride in, with everyone riding cautiously to make it down the technical course. Unfortunately a flat tyre for Brad meant he was unable to finish the race.

Sunday was a very early start for Cross-Country. With the tracks having dried out slightly, conditions were much better for racing. All of the team completed the course in good time amongst some very tough competition. The team appreciated parent Jeremy Savage volunteering as a Marshall for



the Enduro race.

Aoraki Cycling Championships – and Two Gold Medals for Maddi Lowry

These championships were held at Levels Raceway, Timaru, on Tuesday 18 June, with three riders **Ethan Titheridge, Oliver Davidson and Maddi Lowry** travelling down from Ashburton College.

The two events on the day were the 2.5km Individual Time Trial and Road Race.

Maddi was first up in the Under 16 Girls' Time Trial and, last to ride of the six riders in her age group, riding very well to secure a three second win.

Ethan and Oliver rode in the large field of Over 16 Boys' and, of the twenty four starters, Ethan placed 10th and Oliver placed just out of the medals in 4th place.

The Under 16 Girls' Road Race was raced over a distance of 12km. Maddi and a Craighead Diocesan School rider broke away early and were able to stay in front for the whole race. In the sprint finish Maddi was able to hang in and gain her second gold of the day.

The Over 16 Boys' 19.2km race was always going to be a torrid affair and the race split up very quickly at the start. Oliver placed himself in to a three person breakaway group from the beginning, with these riders never in any danger of being caught by the main group.

In the sprint finish Oliver claimed 3rd place with Ethan claiming a creditable 9th place. 2018 Cycling National Road

Championships

These Championships were held in Christchurch, from 29 September–01 October 2018.

Team members for the Sunday and Monday racing were Oliver Davidson, Maddi Lowry and Isabella Roulston, with Oliver Davidson gaining the best placing, from the Road Race held at Loburn on a slightly undulating course and with each grade having a very strong field of entries.

Oliver Davidson, finished a very creditable 7th place and first South Island competitor in the Under 17 Boys' which saw a very strong field of sixty one riders take the start line.

Track Cycling Championships 2018

The College team of Maddi Lowry, Isabella Roulston and Ethan Titheridge competed in the South Island Secondary Schools' Championships in Invercargill on Wednesday 10 October 2018, respectively in the Under 15 Girls', Under 17 Girls' and Under 16 Boys' events. Team Manager Amanda Evans, said that this is a one-day Omnium-type competition consisting of four events.

Isabella Roulston had a great championship particularly given she was returning from injury.



Isabella placed 2nd overall, gained from 1st placings in the Keirin and 3km Points Race; 2nd in the 4km Scratch Race and 3rd in the 3km Tempo Race.

Maddi Lowry, competing in the biggest field, recorded **4th placing overall**, gained from 4th in the Points and Tempo Races; 5th in the 1500m Scratch and 6th in the 515m Scratch Races.

Ethan Titheridge, rode in a field which contained some very strong riders, including nationally ranked competitors, with their pace proving challenging at times, but he gained 7th placing overall, gained from 7th placings in the Temol, 4km Points Races and the Keirin; 8th placing in the 3km Scratch Race.

Cycling New Zealand Schools' 2019 National Track Championships for Ethan Titheridge and Maddi Lowry

This national event was held at the SIT Zero Fees Velodrome in Invercargill on Tuesday 08 and Wednesday 09 October.



Bronze Medal for Isabella Roulston at Track Cycling National Championships 2019

Riding for the Canterbury Team at the Premier Vantage Elite and Under 19 Track Cycling National Championships from 7–10 February, Isabella claimed a Bronze Medal in the Under 19 Women's Sprint.

This is a timed event, with times in the heats ranking riders to go through to the quarter and semi-finals. Isabella's heat time of 12.902 was also, satisfyingly, a Personal Best. In the heats, riders are timed individually, before entering the quarter, semi-finals and final, where they race one versus one.

This event heralded the end of the track season for Isabella and a change to training on the road, as Isabella put it – lots of hours by herself. Her training usually consists of gym work in the morning and riding in the afternoon, for 10–15 hours a week. Pre-nationals the regime included travelling to Christchurch four times a week for training and racing.

Southern Tour Cycling

College Manager Michelle Davidson said a small team of two students - Oliver Davidson and Ethan Titheridge - travelled to 'sunny' Blenheim for two days of very competitive racing. Unfortunately Maddi Lowry had to miss the event due to illness.

Oliver, at 17 years 6 months, was racing in the Under 20 boys' section; while Ethan raced in the Under 17 age group.

The first day was held at Seddon, with a cool start to the day but with sun shining making for very pleasant racing conditions.

Oliver had an excellent race in the Criterium, executing a very strong attack in the last lap to secure an impressive **2nd place**, while **Ethan** rode hard all day with good results.

On day two the sun was shining again, and the day kicked off with the Hill Climb; a short-sharp challenging Time Trial; followed by the Road Race later in the morning.

Oliver had another good race finishing the Road Race in 4th place, and Ethan finishing a creditable 16th.

Michelle said that both boys had a great weekend, with Ethan using the event to prepare for his upcoming track season.

Other results from the two days were -

Oliver: Individual Time Trial (4.34:650) 9th place; Ethan: Individual Time Trial (4.57:64) 18th place. Day One General Classification results had Oliver at 5th equal and Ethan 13th placed. Oliver: Day 2 Hill Climb (3.14:73) 14th place; Ethan: Day 2 Hill Climb (3:45:70) 22nd place.

Oliver finished 6th overall in the General Classification placings in his grade which was a fantastic result, as he was competing against a very strong field of riders. The boys raced in their new College kit which received lots of compliments.

Impressive Individual Results for Ted Yee at the New Zealand Schools' Cross-Country Skiing Championship, 2018

Ted Yee was Ashburton College's sole representative at this event, held on Saturday 15 September 2018 at Cardrona's Snow Farm Nordic ski area. Coach/Manager was Ted's father, Edmund Yee.

The event covered all school levels – Primary, Intermediate and Secondary, with the four secondary schools represented being Mt Aspiring College (Wanaka), Columbia and John McGlashan Colleges (Dunedin) plus Ashburton College. Overall nine school teams were represented, accounting for thirty nine pre-registered racers.

Championship racing rules required schools to have a minimum of three student racers entered in order to receive a medal or cup award, which meant Ashburton College did not have the minimum three students entered to be considered for awards.

Race categories for the day were the 2km Individual Classic, a 1km Individual Freestyle Sprint, and a 3x1km Team Relay Freestyle.

The day's first race, the 2km Classic style, was a mass start format. After the first two racers pulled away from the pack and finished, there was an incredibly close fight for third place between Ashburton's Ted Yee and local Wanaka student Angus Cagney of Mt Aspiring College.

3rd Placing for Ted Yee – The outcome came down to the last turn 80 metres from the finish line, with them on each other's heels. Angus who was leading, suddenly slipped and fell on the flats 40 metres from the finish, giving Ted the chance to pass on the outside. The stadium erupted as families and fellow Wanaka area students were up and cheering as Angus recovered, fighting to come back.

However, Ted held him off for a two second lead to take third place. Race official and Mt Aspiring College Coach Ian McNabb said they don't usually get to see such close finishes or such closely matched skiers, noting it was great to have some competition for Angus.

In the second race of the day, the 1km Freestyle Skate race, individuals start at 30 second intervals.


3rd Placing for Will Kelly in the Boys' Giant Slalom
